SESSIONS of 1963

RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE IOWA CO. BOARD

- Rule 1. The hour of meeting shall be 10:00 o'clock a. m. and 2 o'clock p.m., unless a different hour shall be prescribed.
- Rule 2. The Chairman shall call the meeting to order at the hour fixed for the meeting. (1) The Clerk shall call the roll of members and (2) a majority being present, the journal of the preceeding meeting shall be read, that any mistakes may be corrected. (3) Motions may be offered.
- Rule 3. The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum, and may speak on points of order in preference to other members.
- Rule 4. The Board shall elect at their annual April meeting a chairman and also a vice-chairman who shall act in the absence, disability, death or resignation of the chairman or request to act and possess powers of the Chairman,
- Rule 5. The Chairman. Vice-Chairman and a committee of three members of the board's selection shall be elected for the purpose of appointing committees and this committee of three will act as a committee on committees.
- Rule 6. All questions shall be stated by the chair. If the Chairman doubts as to the voice of the majority he or any member of the Board may call for a vote by either roll call or rising vote on the question to be decided.
- Rule 7. The following standing committees shall be appoint-Committee on Claims. Committee on Equalization, Committee on Treasurer's, Clerk's, and Highway Accounts, Committee on Finance, Taxation and Budget, Committee on Hospital and Home, Committee on Resolutions from without the County, Committee on Tax Claims and Addressograph, Committee on Bonds and Salaries. Committee on Register of Deeds, Clerk of Court and District Attorney Accounts, Committee on Public Property, Committee on Publishing and Printing, Committee on County Highway Study, Superintendent of Schools Committee, Committee on Agriculture. Committee on Personnel and Sheriff's Committee, Committee on Public Health, Committee on Conservation, Committee on Civil Defense. Airport and Industrial Development Committee, Service Officer Committee. Library Committee. The size of committees shall be limited to not less than three nor more than five members. No member of the Highway Committee may serve on any other committee of the County Board.
- Rule 8. After the journal shall have been read the order of business shall be as follows: 1. Letters, Petitions, Remonstrations, Communications and Accompanying Documents. 2. Resolutions. 3. Reports of committee, first standing and afterwards, special committees. 4. Miscellaneous business.
- Rule 9. Every member present shall vote unless excused by the Chairman.
- Rule 10. Every vote taken in regard to levying taxes, appropriating money, or dividing or altering the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be taken by Yeas and Nays, and the same shall be entered on the journal.

- Rule 11. The Yeas and Nays on any question shall be entered on the journal at the request of one of the members present.
- Rule 12. No petitions, resolutions or motions having for its object the division or alteration of the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be entered on or considered at the same session of the Board at which it was introduced, but the same shall lie over for consideration at the next regular adjourned or special session of the Board.
- Rule 13. No mention, other than the receiving of petitions, remonstrations, communications, claims, and the reference of the same to appropriate Committees or to adjourn shall be acted upon in the absence of any committee in the regular discharge of their duty unless such motion had been made at a previous meeting and a special assignment had for its consideration.
- Rule 14. No report or resolution appropriating any money shall be acted upon until the next day after presentation without permission of a majority of the members elected.
- Rule 15. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts Rules of Order shall govern in all cases where they are applicable.
- Rule 16. Any of the foregoing rules, except Rules 10 and 12 may be rescinded, changed or suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- Rule 17. Rules Nos. 10 and 12 may be rescinded, altered or suspended by a two-thirds vote of all the members entitled to seats on the Couuty Board.
- Rule 18. The Committee on Equalization shall render their report immediately after roll call on the frst day of the session but said report shall not be acted upon on the day which it is presented.
- Rule 19. The Chairman shall appoint two or more members of the Board, who shall visit the County Hospital and Home any time within one month after their appointment and file their written report as to the condition found after their visit. And for each succeeding month thereafter, a like committee shall be appointed whose duties shall be the same as the first committee, but no member shall be appointed on such committee oftener than once in twelve months, the compensation to be \$5.00 per visit in full for said trip.
- Rule 20. No informal ballot cast by this Board shall be declared a formal ballot. In no case shall any official be elected by this Board by casting a unanimous vote in favor of any candidate or nominee.
- Rule 21. The Board shall meet in regular session on the third Tuesday of January of each year.
- Rule 22. All officers elected by the County Board except those elected at the April session, shall be nominated and all nominations lay over to the following day before they are voted on.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Duties of the County Highway Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. The County Highway Committee shall have supervision over the maintenance and construction of all roads and bridges as provided by the statutes and shall submit to the County Board an anyided by the statutes and shall submit to the County Board as annual report including the report of the County Highway Committee of all receipts and expenditures in the County Highway Department and shall submit an annual budget and recommendations for the tax levy for road and bridge purposes to the County Board at the annual session and any other duties as outlined in the statutes or as directed by County Board Action.
- The County Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the Iowa County Traffic Department.
- The Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the operation of the County Ambulance.

Duties of the Sheriff's Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- The Sheriff's Committee shall examine all accounts and claims filed against the County by the Sheriff and his deputies, and make report to the County Board at each regular meeting thereof.
- The Sheriff's Committee shall also have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the county police radio system, and shall act upon such other matters as may be referred to it by the County Board.

Duties of the Resolution Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

 To receive and examine all resolutions from without the County and make report thereof to the County Board.

Duties of the General Claims Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

 To audit, allow or disallow all claims filed in the office of the County Clerk or referred to the committee, and shall file a schedule of such claims allowed with the County Clerk, for payment and shall make a report to the County Board of all claims audited.

Duties of the Equalization Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To have supervision over and make an equalization of the assessments on all property in the county for taxes between the several towns, villages and cities of the county.
- 2. It shall be the duty of this committee to make a detailed report thereof at the annual session of the board.
- 3. This committee shall meet annually with the Supervisor of Assessments and County Assessors at their spring meeting.

Duties of the Tax Claims Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To consider, examine and report to the county board, its findings in all matters of illegal assessments, tax titles and delinquent lands that may come before the board for action.
- 2. To supervise all delinquent taxes returned to the County, supervise the taking of tax deeds, supervise the sale of real estate taken on tax deed to the end that property is returned to the tax roll and aid in the collection of delinquent taxes. Where the value of the property involved warrants it the Committee shall have the power to appraise the property and in its discretion insure it for the benefit of the County.
- To make appraisals pursuant to Chapter 75.69 of the county owned tax deed lands.
- To sell and dispose to the best interests of the county those lands to which the county has taken tax deeds.
- 5. To employ the services of the county surveyor to establish the location of county owned property when necessary.
- To authorize and recommend the county treasurer at their discretion to assign to heirs, mortgages or adjacent property owners, tax certificates purchased by the county at the annual sale of tax certificates.

Duties of the Finance Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To prepare and present to the County Board at the Annual Session the Budget and Tax Levy; first in a temporary form, and finally in a complete form as changed during the County Board Session.
- To report upon all resolutions and petitions for appropriations presented to the Board.
- To report and make recommendations on the finances of the County from time to time when required.

Duties of the Bonds and Salaries Committee It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To recommend to the County Board the compensation of County officers and employees.
- To determine the amount of Bonds to be furnished by the County officers to the County and to report on the sufficiency of such bonds.
- To designate and report to the County Board the Banks of Iowa County that may apply as a depository for county funds.

Duties of Agricultural Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee;

 To perform all duties prescribed by law as further instructed by the County Board. The general duty of the Committee is to protect and enhance the financial interest of the county in all things agricultural.

This committee, working in conjunction with state and federal authorities shall according to statute, enter into, consummate and cancel contracts with all extension workers and be the authority in the matter of policy of the extension office.

This committee shall bring before the proper committee requests for appropriations for fiscal years, listing the salaries and estimated expense of each department of extension work.

The Agricultural Committee shall examine and approve all claims filed against Iowa County by the Extension Department.

The Agricultural Committee has in the past requested the assistance of agricultural leaders of the county in the formation of an agricultural program for the year. This privilege is to continue.

When a county becomes a soil conservation district, the Agricultural Committee automatically becomes supervisor of said conservation contracts.

The Agricultural Committee shall act in an advisory capacity on all agricultural appropriations unless otherwise instructed by the County Board.

Duties of Personnel Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To set the policy of each department when not in conflict with the Statutes or when called upon for this purpose, also to designate the duties and responsibilities of the different offices.
- To hear and consider grievances reported by county departments, county officers and county employees and to make their recommendations to the County Board.
- All matters pertaining to clerk hire, working hours and conditions, departmental problems or questions shall be referred to this committee.
- 4. To meet annually not later than October 15 of each year. Duties of Committee on Clerk's, Treasurer's and Highway Accounts It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:
- 1. To meet with the State Auditors to study and examine the report on the accounts of the County Clerk, County Treasurer and Highway Department, and to make a report to the County Board.
- To audit the Accounts of the Justices of Iowa County as provided by the Wisconsin Statutes,
- To approve the reports of the County Clerk and County Treasurer before being presented to the County Board.

Duties of Committee on District Attorney, Register of Deeds and Clerk of Courts Accounts

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

 To approve the reports of the District Attorney, Register of Deeds and Clerk of Courts.

Duties of Public Property Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To supervise and have charge of the Court House, County Jail and the grounds of these buildings and the Gov. Dodge home site.
 - 2. To keep in repair and good condition these properties.
- 3. In order to maintain uniformity of equipment, the Public Property Committee shall purchase the equipment for all the offices in the Court House with the following exceptions — no office equipment shall be purchased for the County Agent's office, Welfare office or Highway Department, except when such purchases are made from the General Fund.
 - This Committee shall function during the year and when the County Board is not in session.

Duties of County Superintendent of Schools Committee It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To act as an advisory committee on all matters pertaining to the office of the County Superintendent of Schools, excepting those duties governed by statute.
- 2. To check the Superintendent's accounts and make recommendations to the board in matters of expense and appropriation.

Duties of the Committee on County Hospital and Home It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To examine the accounts of the Hospital and Home.
- To compare the vouchers as filed with the County Clerk with the records of the institutions and to compare the revenues received at the Hospital and Home with the receipts issued by the County Treasurer.
- 3. To act as an advisory committee with the Board of Trustees in the maintenance, repairs and construction of buildings.
- 4. To report to the County Board, but in no way interfere with the management of the Hospital and Home by the Board of Trustees as established by law.

Duties of the Printing Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To accept bids on the printing of the County Board Proceedings, stationery envelopes for county officers and Court Calendars.
- To act on all matters of printing referred to them by the County Board.

Duties of Conservation Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

 To audit the accounts of any money appropriated by the County Board for conservation work.

- To supervise the purchase of equipment and supplies in which the money appropriated by the County Board is used.
- 3. To have charge of and advise the Iowa County Board of all matters relative to conservation of the natural resources of the county and to cooperate with all county, state and federal organizations in the development of the same.

Duties of Highway Study Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To receive all petitions referred to it by the County Board, by the regular highway committee and any citizen group relating to the construction, relocation, maintenance and repairs of any Federal, State or County road in the county and report their recommendations to the next meeting of the County Board.
- To confer with the regular Highway Committee on all allocations and grants of Federal and State funds and on any other highway matters of major importance.
 - 3. This committee is merely advisory.

Duties of the Health Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To act in an advisory capacity with the County Nurse on all types of health programs.
- 2. Annually plan and recommend the budget for the health program.

Duties of the lowa County Board of Public Welfare

- 1. At the first meeting of such board, elect from their number, a chairman, a secretary, and such other officers as they deem necessary. Vacancies in such offices shall be filled for the unexpired terms. The Chairman shall preside at all meetings when present, and shall countersign all actions taken by the board. In case of the absence of a chairman for any meeting the members present shall chose a temporary chairman.
- Appoint a county director of public welfare subject to the provisions of s. 49.50 (2) to (5) and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.
- 3. Supervise the working of the county department of public welfare and shall be a policy-making body determing the broad outlines and principles governing the administration of the functions, duties and powers assigned to said department under s. 46.22 (4) and (5).
- 4. Whenever it determines that there is a need therefor, appoint committees consisting of residents of the county, which committee shall advise with the board on any matter for which they are created, but members of such committees shall serve without compensation.
- Consult with the county director of public welfare concerning the preparation of the annual budget, the annual report of the county department of public welfare and the appointment of necessary personnel.

NOW COMES the plaintiff, by its attorneys, Aberg, Bell, Blake & Metzner, and for its cause of action against the defendant, respectfully alleges and shows to the court as follows:

- (1) That the Town of Brigham is a corporate body organized and exisiting under Chapter 60 of the Wisconsin Statutes.
- (2) That the defendant, Iowa County, is a body corporate empowered to sue and be sued under the provisions of Wisconsin Statutes 59.01, and is a corporate entity within the State of Wisconsin with its county seat at Dodgeville, Wisconsin.
- (3) That plaintiff, by its Town Board, brings this action against the defendant and is authorized so to do.
- (4) That there has been organized at all times material hereto in Iowa County the Twin Parks Watershed, a joint project between Iowa County and the United States Government covering 76,227 acres.
- (5) That on November 15, 1960, the County Board of Iowa County adopted Resolution No. 19 creating the Twin Parks Watershed and committing in the interests and benefit of all people in the Iowa County Soil Conservation District a sum of \$100,000 as the cash contribution of Iowa County towards said project.
- (6) That by appropriate resolution the Iowa County Board authorized the Agricultural Committee of the Board to expend money and to pay claims for work done on the Twin Parks Watershed project.
- (7) That in 1962 there was approved as part of the Twin Parks Watershed project the location of a dam in the Town of Brigham at a site designated as Location 9.
- (8) That said dam in the Town of Brigham as proposed called for the flooding of a section of about one quarter mile of town road in Section 20, T 7 N, R 5 E, in the Town of Brigham, and the relocation of about one-half mile of said road.
- (9) That the obligation to relocate the town road in question and to do all work in connection therewith and to undertake all expenses in connection with said relocation was the obligation of lowa County.
- (10) That Iowa County, by its authorized agents, advised the Town Board of the Town of Brigham that Iowa County equipment was tied up in other projects and that it would be difficult, if not impossible, for county equipment to properly relocate the road in question prior to the construction of the dam at Location 9.
- (11) That because of the time elements involved, the Town of Brigham was authorized and did proceed to handle the relocation of the town road; that unusual conditions were encountered in said relocation, including a grade of 8% and a distance of 250 feet requiring a raise to an elevation 50 feet higher than the beginning point, a cut through a rock layer where blasting could not be used because of possible damage to a spring, the cutting through of a heavy stand of timber of such density some 85 saw logs were obtained, and the necessity of a cattle pass for certain property.

- (12) That the total cost of relocating the road in question was \$12,719.47.
- (13) That prior to the commencement of the construction, the Agricultural Committee of the Iowa County Board was present at the site of the road relocation and discussed the project with members of the Town Board; that at said time, the Agricultural Committee, which was authorized to act for Iowa County and was empowered by resolution of the Iowa County Board to expend money for the Twin Parks Watershed project, was fully aware that the Town of Brigham would proceed with the relocation of the road in question and that said Town of Brigham was in fact encouraged to do so.
- (14) That on or about November 13, 1962, the County Board of Iowa County by appropriate action passed a resolution that "cost of construction of road in the Town of Brigham, made necessary by construction of Twin Parks Watershed, be paid in full from watershed funds."
- (15) That lowa County has paid on the account of the relocation of the town road to the Town of Brigham the sum of \$9,000.00; that there remains unpaid on said account the sum of \$3,719.47.
- (16) That appropriate demand has been made on Iowa County for the payment of the balance of the cost of the relocation of the road in question and that said demand has been denied.
- (17) That the Town Board of the Town of Brigham at a regular board meeting on July 3, 1963 authorized the institution of this action and is authorized so to do under Wis. Stats. 60.29 (4).

WHEREFORE, plaintiff demands judgment against the defendant for the sum of \$3,719.47, together with its costs and disbursements in this action.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Iowa County: Re: Town of Brigham vs. Iowa County

Gentlemen:

On July 8, 1963, I received a copy of the Summons and Complaint in the above entitled matter. These papers were also served on the Iowa County Clerk as provided by law. The Complaint demands judgment for the sum of \$3,719.47, plus costs and disbursements. We now have twenty days from the date of service within which to answer this Complaint. If no answer is served a default judgment may be taken by the plaintiff.

The alternatives open to you are as follows:

- Authorize the preparation of an Answer and the defense of the action.
- Instruct that no action be taken and the matter be allowed to go as a default.
- Authorize negotiations with the plaintiff in an attempt to effect a compromise settlement.

Ever since the matter was first called to my attention, I have been in favor of the latter course of action for at least two fairly good reasons. The first of these is that from what I have been able to determine it is not by any means out of the question that the whole law suit could be lost together with costs and disbursements. In this same connection I might add that it seems fairly obvious to me that at least some fault has existed on both sides in this matter and that this be considered as necessitating a compromise. A second and by all means not any less important reason concerns the effect of such an action on further watershed programs. Such a suit between governmental units is bad enough in any case but its possible effect on the thinking of other towns and villages that will be concerned with watershed planning should also be considered.

For these reasons I think that it would be well to consider the possibilities of some compromise settlement.

Should no action be taken by the Board I will interpret this as a desire to let the matter go by default and will prepare no answer to the Complaint.

Agreement (No. 4) between Iowa County and the Iowa County Hwy. Employees, Local 1266, AFL - CIO, was read.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN

IOWA COUNTY and IOWA COUNTY EMPLOYEES

Local 1266, AFSCME, AFL-CIO - July 15, 1963 through 1964

This agreement made and entered into this 11th day of July, 1963 by and between Iowa County, Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as the Employer, and Iowa County Employees, Local 1266, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, hereinafter referred to as the Union.

SECTION I

The mutual interest of the Employer and the employees is recognized by this agreement for the operation of the various departments under methods that will promote safety to the employee, economy of operations, cleanliness and proper care of equipment and the protection of property, the facilities of a fair and peaceful adjustment of differences that may arise from time to time, the promulgating of rules and regulations and ethical conduct of business and relations between the Employer and the employees and to this end have reached this agreement.

SECTION II Recognition

The Employer recognizes the Union as the exclusive collective bargaining representative for all the employees of the Iowa County Highway Department, except the Commissioner, Patrol Superintendent and office clerical employees on all questions of wages, hours and conditions of employment.

SECTION III Probationary Period

- A. All newly hired employees shall serve a ninety (90) day probationary period. During such probationary period they shall not attain any seniority rights and shall be subject to dismissal for any reason without recourse to the grievance procedure. Seasonal employees who upon initial hire work less than ninety (90) days before being laid off shall be entitled to credit for such probationary time if recalled to work the following seasons.
- B. Upon completion of the ninety (90) day probationary period the employee shall be granted seniority rights from the date of original hire, and his hourly rate shall advance to the rate shown in Exhibit A for his classification. A seniority roster shall be posted on all Shop Bulletin Boards and brought up to date every six months by the employer.

SECTION IV Seniority Rights

- A. It shall be the policy of the Employer to recognize seniority in filling vacancies, making promotions, and in laying off or re-hiring, provided however, that the application of seniority shall not materially affect the efficient operation of the Iowa County Highway Department.
- B. Seniority shall be based upon the actual length of continuous service for which payment has been received by the employee.
- C. There shall be two seniority groups, full-time employees and seasonal employees. Seasonal employees' seasonal group shall be below that of the full-time employees and all seasonal employees shall be laid off prior to any reduction in the full-time employee working force.
- D. When laying off seasonal employees, the oldest in point of service shall be retained if qualified to perform the available work. When laying off full-time employees, the oldest in point of service shall be retained if the remaining personnel are qualified to perfom the available work. The rehiring of employees that have been layed off shall be in inverse order to that of laying off.
- E. Whenever a vacancy occurs or a new job is created it shall be posted on all Shop Bulletin Boards for a period of five working days. Each employee interested in applying for the job shall endorse his name upon such notice in the space provided. The fultime employee with the greatest seniority who can qualify shall be

given the job. If no full-time employee bidding can quality for the job, it shall be given to the seasonal employee with the greatest seniority who can qualify. The Employer shall have the right to temporarily fill a job that is posted. However, such temporary filling of the job shall continue only for a reasonable time after the end of the five days posting or the settlement of a grievance if one should arise.

- F. The initial determination as to an employee's qualifications shall be made by the Employer. However, if there is any difference of opinion as to the qualifications of an employee, the Union Committee, and/or Union Representative may take the matter up for adjustment under Section V, Grievance procedure.
- G. An employee who quits, or is layed off for a period of twenty-four months, or fails to report for work within fifteen days from postmark on notice of recall, or is discharged. except those reinstated under Section V, Grievance Procedure, shall lose all prior seniority rights.

SECTION V

Grievance Procedure

Any difference or misunderstanding which may arise between the Employer and an employee or between the Employer and the Union shall be handled as follows:

- Step. 1. The Union Committee, and/or Union Representative shall present the grievance to the Highway Commissioner.
- Step. 2. If a satisfactory settlement is not reached as outlined in Step 1 within one week, the Union Committee, and/or Union Representative may present the grievance to the Iowa County Highway Committee. Such a meeting shall be held within one week of receipt of written request by the other party unless a later date is set by mutual agreement.
- Step. 3. If a satisfactory settlement is not reached as outlined in Step 2 within two weeks either party to this agreement may request mediation or fact-finding services of the Wisconsin Employment Relations Board.
- Step. 4. The results of such mediation or fact-finding shall be made known to all parties concerned who shall endeavor to settle the dispute on the basis thereof.

If a discharged employee claims injustice in his discharge, the request for a meeting on the grievance shall be made within five working days. Request shall be made by letter, postmark on letter to be considered time of request. Such grievance shall be handled under the procedures outlined in the above steps.

SECTION VI Leaves of Absence

- A. Written Leave of absence, without pay, for periods not in excess of six months in any year may, in the discretion of the Employer, be granted to any full-time employee. Failure to grant leave of absence shall not be grounds for a grievance. The employee to whom written leave of absence has been granted shall be entitled, at the expiration of the time stated on such leave, to be reinstated to the position in which he was employed at the time the leave was granted. The Union shall be provided with a copy of the written leave, by the Employer, at the time such leave is granted.
- B. Leave of absence shall be automatically granted all fulltime employees who are called or volunteer for military service and such employees shall be reinstated to their former job at the expiration of their military service under and pursuant to the provisions of Section 45.50 of the Wisconsin Statutes, 1961.

SECTION VII Holidays

- A. Each employee upon the completion of his probationary period shall be granted the following holidays off with pay or compensatory time off as outlined in subsection B, below: (1) New Year's Day, (2) Memorial Day, (3) 4th of July, (4) Labor Day, (5) Thanksgiving Day, and (6) Christmas Day, and one-half day on Good Friday. If any of the above mentioned holidays fall on a Sunday, the following Monday shall be deemed the holiday. If the holiday falls on a Saturday, the Friday before or the Monday following the holiday shall, in the discretion of the Employer be declared the holiday.
- B. If any employee receiving an hourly rate of pay is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid at his straight time rate of pay for all time worked on such holiday in addition to holiday pay. If an employee receiving a monthly salary is required to work on a holiday he shall receive compensatory time off equal to the time actually worked by such employee on the holiday in lieu of additional compensation. Employees entitled to compensatory time off under this section may be required to request such time off at least one week in advance to the Highway Commissioner. Compensatory time off must be used within six months from date of the holiday.

SECTION VIII Vacations

- A. Each fulltime employee shall receive one week's vacation with pay each year after one calendar year of employment and two weeks' vacation with pay each year after three years of employment.
- B. The number of employees on vacation, within a given classification, at any given period shall be determined by the Highway Commissioner.
- C. Choice of vacation time, within a given classification shall be by seniority.
- D. Vacation pay shall be based on a forty-five (45) hour work week.
- E. Employees who give at least two weeks' prior notice to quitting and employees whose service being terminated due to discharge or death or retirement shall receive all earned vacation based upon actual months of service. If an employee's service is terminated before the sixteenth (16th) of the month he shall not receive credit for such month; however, if the termination occurs on or after the sixteenth (16th) of the month, credit for a full month shall be credited toward the pro-rated vacation allowance.

SECTION IX Sick Leave

- A. Each full-time employee shall earn and accumulate when not used one sick leave day with pay for each two months or major fraction thereof of employment until a total of sixty (60) days has been accumulated.
- B. Sick leave pay shall begin on the first day of absence and notice must be given prior to the regular starting time if at all possible for the employee to do so. Any employee off from work without a written leave of absence in excess of three working days shall support his claim for sick leave benefits by satisfactory evidence that he was under a doctor's care while absent.

- C. In the event of serious illness or death in an employee's immediate family, absence up to and including three days will be allowed without loss of pay.
- D. In the event of a death of an employee of the Iowa County Highway Department, all employees covered by this agreement shall be allowed one-half day off to attend the funeral without loss of pay.

SECTION X

SECTION X

- Hours of Work Wages and Classifications
- A. The hours of work for full-time employees shall be 7:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 12:30 p.m. until 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.
- B. It shall be the policy to keep overtime at a minimum and it is expected that overtime will be worked only in emergencies which are beyond the control of either party to this agreement. However, when it becomes necessary to work overtime it shall be divided as equally as is reasonably possible among those employees qualified to perform the overtime work required.
- C. Each employee when not able to do so on his own time shall be allowed time off without loss of pay to cast his ballot on all legally constituted elections.
- D. "Exhibit A," "Classification and Wages," attached hereto and made a part hereof shall be in effect for the life of this agreement.

SECTION XI Dues Deduction

The Employer agrees to deduct union dues from employees' wages upon written authorization by the employee. The deductions shall be made once each month and the total of such deductions made payable to the Union treasurer within ten days of such deduction.

SECTION XII Alteration — Limitation and Duration

- A. This agreement may be amended anytime during its life upon the mutual consent of the Employer and the Union.
- B. Neither party to this agreement by such act at any time hereto and subsequently thereof agrees to, or does waiver any rights possessed by it, or them, under State or Federal Laws, regulations or Statutes.
- C. This agreement shall be effective as of July 15, 1963, and shall remain in full force and effect until January 1, 1965, and shall automatically renew itself from year to year thereafter until such time that either party desiring to alter, amend, or otherwise change this agreement, serves written notice upon the other not later than Septembr 1, 1964 or the first day of September in any year thereafter. Only amendments or changes that are stated in the written notice or notices may be subject to renegotiations.

It is further agreed that requests for wage increases and fringe benefits which substantially effect the Employer's budgeting shall be made by August 1st of any year. Such changes agreed to shall not be effective prior to the beginning of the next contract year.

In a meeting with the above committee, this writer discussed the scope of remodeling the old Iowa County Jail. We determined the need to include the following:

- -Provide a large meeting space for 50 to 60 people.
- -Provide one "Men" and one "Women" toilet rooms.
- -Provide space for home-economics demonstration kitchen.
- —Provide small storage closet for materials that are to be kept under lock and key.
- -Provide new windows in the present openings.
- -Widen the present exit to receive a standard exit door.
- -Provide adequate lighting for the above spaces.

The budget for the above was set at an investment cost of \$5,000.00. This writer has made a preliminary cost analysis of the above work. The total amount is approximately \$8,000.00, therefore, I would like to suggest the committee take this proposal to the County Board for careful consideration.

We propose to make a thorough analysis of the old jail building to determine how best to remodel the building for greatest use. We believe this building can be remodeled in such a way as to provide the above large meeting space as well as many useful office spaces. The new areas would be larger and more efficient than the present.

We realize the total cost of such extensive remodeling would be larger than the \$5,000.00 budget stipulated. but we feel such a report would outline judicious remodeling in several stages, thereby retaining the architectural integrity of both the old courthouse and the jail building. We would like to present our ideas for such remodeling to the entire County Board. We do not feel the present remodeling on such a limited budget to be the wisest use of County Funds.

At the beginning of the fourth calendar year of employment and each year thereafter an employee shall be allowed two weeks' vacation to be taken anytime during the calendar year.
- 3) Each full-time employee shall earn sick leave after completion of probation period at the rate of one-half day per month or major fraction thereof of employment until a total of sixty (60) days has been accumulated. Any employee claiming more than three days sick leave at any one time shall support his claim by satisfactory evidence that he was under a doctor's care while absent.
- 4) In the event of serious illness or death in an employee's immediate family, absence up to and including three days will be allowed without loss of pay.
- 5) Employees who give at least two weeks' prior notice to quitting and employees whose service being terminated due to discharge or death or retirement shall receive all earned vacation based upon actual months of service.

Be It Further Resolved the recommendations of this resolution be effective January 1, 1964; that it supersede all county board action in conflict to it; and if it passes approval of the county board a certified copy of the action be provided each department head.

COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION & MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1964

SECTION I. The County Board of Supervisors of Iowa County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work in the year 1964 under the provisions of Section 20.420 and Chapter 83 of the Statutes, and the additional sums herein appropriated, shall be expended as hereinafter set forth:

SECTION II. COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY ALLOTMENT. WHEREAS, the State Highway Commission has notified the County Clerk that a sum of money estimated to be Two hundred & two thousand, seven hundred Dollars (\$202,700.00) will become available at the end of the fiscal year under the provisions of Sections 83.10 and 20.420 (83) and (84) of the Statutes, for the county trunk highway system in the county, but the actual amount will not be known until the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Highway Committee is authorized and directed to expend the said sum to the extent required to match and supplement Federal aid for construction, right of way, and other costs on any Federal projects located on the county trunk highway system of said county, which are not recovered from Federal funds, and to expend any balance for constructing, repairing, and maintaining such county trunk highway system and the bridges thereon, including snow and ice removal and control, as directed in Section 83.10(1) of the Statutes, and to reimburse the general fund for any expenditures that may be made therefrom pursuant to Section 83.01(6) of the Statutes. The distribution to such purposes is estimated but not specifically directed, to be as follows:

SECTION III. WHEREAS, it appears that certain additional highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums for the purpose hereinafter set forth:

For the maintenance of the County Trunk Highway System the sum of Two hundred & twenty-five thousand — no/100 Dollars (\$225,000.00).

For emergency road or bridge repairs or construction, the necessity for which is determined by the County Highway Committee and for which other funds are not available, the sum of Twenty five thousand — no/100 Dollars (\$25,000.00).

For the purchase of machinery and for machinery repairs the sum of \$150,000.00 received from machinery rental.

For the purchase of county gravel pits and stone quarries the sum received from sale of materials.

For administration, including salaries, per diem. officer and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of Fifteen thousand—no/100 Dollars (\$15.000,00).

Total Authorized in this Section

\$265,000.00

SECTION IV. WHEREAS appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts to be received from the state and available for work in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the county to meet such appropriations as follows:

For the various purposes as set forth in Section III hereof the sum of \$265,000.00.

SECTION V. WHEREAS, the various highway activities for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work cannot be known at the time of making the appropriation therefor,

BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropriation for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed may be used by the County Highway Committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement, which is part of the same item in the county budget, for which provision is herein made, and any balances remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year.

SECTION VI. WHEREAS, the exact amount of the funds that will become available from the state for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes will not be known until on or after June 30, 1964,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments for the purpose for which such funds are to be used, as herein-before authorized, from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purposes for which appropriated prior to August 1. 1964, and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the same received under

Section 20.420 of the Statutes.

SECTION VII. WHEREAS, the County Highway Committee and the County Highway Commissioner are charged with the duty and responsibility of carrying out the construction and maintenance of highways for which provision is made, and other related supervisory and administrative duties.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Highway Commissioner shall have authority to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate such personnel as he deems necessary for such purposes, provided however that the County Highway Committee may by action recorded in its minutes determine the number of persons to be hired and may also at any time by action so recorded order the County Highway Commissioner to employ, discharge suspend, or reinstate any such person. The term "personnel" or "person" shall include all patrolmen, laborers, foremen, clerks. stenographers, or other employees necessary to carry on such activities.

THEREFORE, in order to provide for promptly making available the funds necessary for such improvements and to avoid the delay and expense incident to calling a special meeting of this board for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the State Highway Commission be and is hereby petitioned to advance pursuant to Section 84.03(5), Wisconsin Statutes, upon the filing of a request therefor by the County Highway Committee of this county, which said Committee is hereby authorized to file, such sums as may be required and are not otherwise available for any such previously authorized or additional needed construction improvements in this county, with the understanding that the amounts thus advanced will be deducted from future state allotments for state trunk highway construction in this county under Section 84.03(3) of the Statutes, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the State Highway Commission be and is hereby petitioned upon the filing of a request therefor by the County Highway Committee of this county, which said Committee is hereby authorized to file, to transfer to or between any such previously authorized or additional needed construction improvements in this county, any funds allotted by the State under the provisions of Section 84.03(3), Wisconsin Statutes, and previously allocated to any other improvements or remaining unallocated in reserve.

WHEREAS: the local taxpayers have to raise for the County's share of the above appropriation upwards of \$65,000.00, to carry out this welfare program and

WHEREAS: due to Federal and State aids under this Welfare program they the Federal and State governments, set up rules and regulations governing the County Welfare Department and

WHEREAS: this leaves practically no voice in the matters of the County Welfare Departments by the local governing bodies, and WHEREAS: in the Opinion of the Attorney General of 1957, book number 46 on page 139, the last three paragraphs read as follows: "The matter of hiring and firing County Welfare Department employees, therefore, has been pretty effectively removed from the direct control of the County Board of Supervisors." 44 O.A.G. 262,266.

For like reasons, the matter of wages of County Welfare Department employees is beyond the direct control of the County Board of Supervisors.

The State Department of Public Welfare has established rules and regulations for the fixing of salaries of employees in the County Welfare Department. Wis. Adm. Code, PW-PA 10, secs. 10.04 and 10.25-10.30., and

WHEREAS: the salaries paid to County Welfare Department employees are so out of proportion to salaries paid other county employees having comparable, the same, or even greater responsibility, and

WHEREAS: with these existing conditions, under present laws the local governing bodies do not have any control, as stated by the Attorney General, and this is very unfair to the local units of government, and

WHEREAS: generally speaking, all legislators seem to go along with the State Department of Public Welfare and continue to give them more rule making powers, etc., which is entirely wrong for the operation of good government, and

WHEREAS: you cannot have a merit system plan on a statewide level and be fair to the smaller counties and the taxpayers that are paying the bills for local, state and Federal government.

SO BE IT RESOLVED: that the legislators take necessary action to eliminate this unfairness immediately, and return these administrative powers to the local governing bodies where they so rightfully belong, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the legislators in Federal and State Government enact laws to make this Federal and State aid program more flexible, so that local units of government can function more economically, without being dictated to by the Federal and State Government.

BE IT STILL FURTHER RESOLVED: that copies of this resolution be forwarded by our county clerk to all County Boards in the State and all legislators of the Federal and State government representing our County. District and State and also the County Boards Association.

- That he is the duly elected, qualified, and acting Secretary of the Southwestern Wisconsin Fair Association of the City of Mineral Point, Iowa County, Wisconsin.
- Attached hereto, marked Exhibit A, and made a part hereof, is the annual report of the operations of the Southwestern Wisconsin Fair Association for the year 1963.
- 3. Premiums paid this year amounted to \$7,082.50. State aid of \$4,725.55 was received. The total state aid applied for was reduced 5.6% due to a shortage of funds available for this purpose. In analyzing the premiums paid \$4.445.50 or 63% was paid to Junior Fair Exhibitors, the balance \$2,637.00 to Open Class Exhibitors. The share of the state aid received applicable to Junior Fair premiums was \$2,977.00, leaving a balance of \$1,513.00 to be paid out of county aid.
- 4. Of the cash on hand in this report, the sum of \$2,000.00 is on certificate of deposit at the Farmers Savings Bank, Mineral Point, Wisconsin. This is the basis for a fund to be used in the repairs or erection of a new exhibit building. Of this sum, \$1,000.00 was allocated from county aid.
- 5. This year, as in the past, no charges were made of Junior Fair Exhibitors or Junior Fair Leaders for admission to the grounds, nor were there any charges made Junior Exhibitors for stall rent. To our knowledge this is the only Fair in our section of the State that does not charge Junior Fair Exhibitors either an entrance fee or stall rent. The Fair considers the value of the approximately one thousand Junior Fair exhibitors and Leader tickets to have a value of, at least, \$2.00 each so that \$2,000.00 was allocated from county aid to cover these tickets.
- The Junior Fair Judges received a total of \$272.50 for their judging work which was allocated from county aid.
- The balance of county aid was allocated to bookkeeping expenses.

REPORT ON ACCOMPLISHMENTS of the IOWA COUNTY HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT for the year of 1963

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Iowa County: Gentlemen:

The following is a list of activities accomplished by your Highway Department in 1963:

C.T.H. "N" Jct. S.T.H. 137 to Jct. C.T.H. "NN" — Hot Mix Bituminous Surface Course and shouldering with F.A.S. and County Funds, done by County Forces, a distance of 2.894 miles.

C.T.H. "G" Jct. C.T.H. "X" to Jct. C.T.H. "E", Village of Mifflin — Hot Mix Bituminous Surface Course and shouldering with County Funds and County Forces, a distance of 3.36 miles.

C.T.H. "G" Jct. C.T.H. "A", Village of Rewey, North 2.1 Miles — Reinfoced present mat and laid new Hot Mix Bituminous Surface Course on the old surface, and shouldered.

C.T.H. "F" Jct. S.T.H. 39, South 3.166 Miles — Reshaped, reinforced and laid new Hot Mix Bituminous Surface Course, and shouldered.

C.T.H. "I" Village of Highland, South to Grant County Line — Reinforced, shouldered, and laid new Hot Mix Bituminous on present surface, a distance of 4.8 miles.

C.T.H. "B" Jct. C.T.H. "G" West — Reinforced, shouldered and laid new Hot Mix Bituminous Mat on present surface, a distance of 4.5 miles.

C.T.H. "SS" Jct. Shake Rag Street, City of Mineral Point, E.E., .65 miles — Reinforced and laid new Hot Mix Bituminous Mat on present surfaces.

C.T.H. "W" Jct. S.T.H. "39" to Jonesdale Bridge, 2.335 miles — This was a F.A.S. Project. Right of way was purchased with County Funds. Grade and base course constructed with F.A.S. and County Funds, which was let by contract.

New Bridge across Dodge Branch of Pecatonica River at Jonesdale — This was constructed with F.A.S. and County Funds, and let by contract.

C.T.H. "W" Jct. S.T.H. 191 to Jonesdale Bridge, a distance of 1.918 Mi. — The Right of Way was purchased with County Funds, Grading by County Forces, with F.A.S. and County Funds. Base Course by contract with F.A.S. and County Funds.

C.T.H. "A" Jct. C.T.H. "G", Village of Rewey easterly to Jct. C.T.H. "J" — Completed plans and surveys, also purchased right of way with County Funds. This is an F.A.S. Project, a letting by contract planned for March 1964. A Distance of 4.25 miles.

C.T.H. "DD" —Constructed new Bridge and approaches on Thomas Stream.

Blue Mounds Park — Laid Hot Mix Bituminous Course on roads and parking areas for the State. The time, material and machinery were on a rental basis.

Governor Dodge State Park — General Winter and Summer Maintenance.

Otter Creek Boat Landing - Constructed Concrete Ramp.

Sixteen County Aid Bridges — Construction and repairs with Town and County Funds, and with Town and County Forces.

A.F.E.'s — General Maintenance, and snow and ice removal on State Roads. Seal Coated Approximately 30 miles of Black Topped County Highways. During the past year our crusher produced 92,262 cubic yards of Crushed Stone and our Hot Mix Plant produced 26,465 cubic yards Bituminous Material.

During the year of 1963 we purchased the following needed equipment — two 22,000 GVW. patrol trucks; one Dodge sedan — commissioner's car; one Sunscope motor tester and analyzer; one Homelite chain saw; one welder with battery charger; two reversible one way plows with quick hitches; two end-gate material spreaders; three-Motorola two-way transistor radios; Four rotary power mowers; one steam cleaner; one Austin Western motor patrol, snow plow and wing; one used tractor and 5,000 gal. capacity semi-trailer, for road oil; one Cummins diesel engine and power steering for a Four Wheel Drive Oskosh truck; one Ford car for patrol superintendent; the purchase of other miscellaneous tools and machinery essentially necessary in operating the department.

The Committee is trying to operate the highway department as efficiently as possible, in the best interests of our citizens. We are well aware of the impossibility of pleasing everyone.

We believe the public should have the right and privilege to express opinions regarding any dissatisfactions they may have, and the availability of the true facts regarding any phase of the department in which they are interested.

We welcome constructive criticism and all workable suggestions as to how we can better serve you.

We wish to express our appreciation to the honorable Board of Supervisors for their considerations of our requests, and the interest shown by the questions asked, pertaining to the reasons why certain highway activities are carried on. Our requests for high way improvements are far greater than we can complete for some time.

We believe the public is getting full value received for the funds expended. The Highway Committee is not in favor of any major tax increase to hasten the construction program.

We wish to thank the commissioner, patrol superintendent, highway clerk, deputy clerks, foremen, mechanics, ambulance crew, traffic patrolmen, and all the employees for the faithful performance of their duties, also the personnel of Division No. 1 office in Madison, for their help and advice.

Annual Report (No. 23) of the Iowa County Welfare Department was presented.

The Honorable Board of Supervisors: Iowa County Dodgeville, Wisconsin Gentlemen:

We are submitting the annual report of the Iowa County Public Welfare Department for the year 1963. In this report, we are presenting interpretative material for a better understanding of what this agency is doing past, present and future. We sincerely hope that this report will give the readers a factual picture of the welfare agency and how it operates, for the best interest of the people that it is intended to serve.

This report includes all the expenditures for the categorical aids such as Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to Dependent Children in Foster Homes, Blind Aid, Aid to the Totally and Permanently Disabled, and for General Relief and Administration.

This agency is very appreciative of the fine cooperation that we have received from the Iowa County Board of Supervisors. Iowa County officials. Iowa County Medical Society, Dodgeville hospitals, Iowa County Home, Iowa County dentists, optometrists, lawyers and other professional and lay people of Iowa County with whom we

have come in contact during the year 1963. Without this fine help and cooperation, this agency could not have given Iowa County the kind of efficient and business like operation that is so vital and necessary. This tremendous assistance is being gratefully acknowledged at this time.

ALD AGE ASSISTANCE

This continues to be the largest and most expensive program of the agency. This is due, to a large part, to the need for and cost of medical care. The Old Age Assistance recipients require regular and prolonged medical care. They live longer, as do all the aged population, and thus suffer the infirmities of older people. The cost of all medical care, while necessary is costly.

In 1963, cash payments were made to an average of 230 persons per month. These Old Age Assistance recipients need medical care, such as physician's services, hospitalization, nursing home care, county home care, drugs, dental care, optometrical service, home care, etc. As the cost of these services increases, the assis-

tance payments increase proportionally.

The Federal reimbursement per Old Age Assistance case was changed from \$55.55 to \$55.25 per month effective July 1, 1963. The State reimbusement continues to be 30 per cent for cash payments and 30 per cent for vendor medical payments after deduction of the Federal aid received for such care.

AID TO DEPENDENT CHILDREN

The second largest program in the number of cases and cost, is Aid to Dependent Children. In 1963, Iowa County provided care for a monthly average of 34 individual cases involving an average of 97 children. Included in this total are the foster home cases. There was a monthly average of 10 children in foster home care.

The Federal reimbursement per eligible recipient count in Aid to Dependent Children was changed from \$20.903 to \$20.825, effective July 1, 1963, for most recipients. The State reimbusement was 33 1/3 per cent for money payments and 35 per cent for vendor medical payments, after deduction of the Federal aid received for such care.

The agency has one child in a foster home, who has no legal settlement in Iowa County, therefore the child is known as a stateat-large case, for which we receive 100 per cent reimbursement. We have one child in a foster home who is eligible for Federal matching. We have been receiving Federal reimbursement for this child since October 1963.

AID TO THE TOTALLY AND PERMANENTLY DISABLED

The number of persons receiving Disabled Aid has continued to increase. A number of Iowa County Home recipients and General Relief cases have qualified for and are currently receiving an Aid to Disabled grant, based on a permanent physical or mental disability, or a combination of both. Due to the number of current applications, the number of such cases will no doubt increase in 1964. The average monthly caseload in 1963 was 29 cases, an increase of 6 cases per month more than in 1962.

The Federal reimbursement for each Disabled Aid case was changed from \$47.585 to \$47.375 per month effective July 1, 1963. The State reimbursement is 30 per cent on money payments and 35 per cent on vendor medical payments, after deduction of the Feder-

GENERAL RELIEF

The Iowa County's expenditures for General Relief have continued to be low, as they have been for the past two years. The relief costs from January through December 1963 amounted to \$17,981.57. The refunds received during this same period amounted to \$3,791.61. The average monthly cost during this twelve months period amounted to \$1.498.46.

This agency has continued to make every effort to locate jobs for able bodied men. If unable to obtain public or private employment, due to lack of work skills, education or mentality, they are referred to the State Vocational Rehabilitation consultant. Due to the lack of able bodied men, requesting financial aid, there has been no one referred to the Iowa County Work Relief Project in some time. However, if such men do apply for General Relief, in the future, they will be referred to this project.
