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**SESSIONS of 1964**

**RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE IOWA CO. BOARD**

Rule 1. The hour of meeting shall be 10:00 o'clock a.m. and 2 o'clock p.m., unless a different hour shall be prescribed.

Rule 2. The Chairman shall call the meeting to order at the hour fixed for the meeting. (1) The Clerk shall call the roll of members and (2) a majority being present, the journal of the preceding meeting shall be read, that any mistakes may be corrected. (3) Motions may be offered.

Rule 3. The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum, and may speak on points of order in preference to other members.

Rule 4. The Board shall elect at their annual April meeting a chairman and also a vice-chairman who shall act in the absence, disability, death or resignation of the chairman or request to act and possess powers of the Chairman.

Rule 5. The Chairman, Vice-Chairman and a committee of three members of the board's selection shall be elected for the purpose of appointing committees and this committee of three will act as a committee on committees.

Rule 6. All questions shall be stated by the chair. If the Chairman doubts as to the voice of the majority he or any member of the Board may call for a vote by either roll call or rising vote on the question to be decided.

Rule 7. The following standing committees shall be appointed: Committee on Claims, Committee on Equalization, Committee on Treasurer's, Clerk's, and Highway Accounts, Committee on Finance, Taxation and Budget, Committee on Hospital and Home, Committee on Resolutions from without the County, Committee on Tax Claims and Addressograph, Committee on Bonds and Salaries, Committee on Register of Deeds, Clerk of Court and District Attorney Accounts, Committee on Public Property, Committee on Publishing and Printing, Committee on County Highway Study, Superintendent of Schools Committee, Committee on Agriculture, Committee on Personnel and Sheriff's Committee, Committee on Public Health, Committee on Conservation, Committee on Civil Defense, Airport and Industrial Development Committee, Service Officer Committee, Library Committee. The size of committees shall be limited to not less than three nor more than five members. No member of the Highway Committee may serve on any other committee of the County Board.

Rule 8. After the journal shall have been read the order of business shall be as follows: 1. Letters, Petitions, Remonstrations, Communications and Accompanying Documents. 2. Resolutions. 3. Reports of committees, first standing and afterwards, special committees. 4. Miscellaneous business.

Rule 9. Every member present shall vote unless excused by the Chairman.

Rule 10. Every vote taken in regard to levying taxes, appropriating money, or dividing or altering the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be taken by Yeas and Nays, and the same shall be entered on the journal.

Rule 11. The Yeas and Nays on any question shall be entered on the journal at the request of one of the members present.

Rule 12. No petitions, resolutions or motions having for its object the division or alteration of the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be entered on or considered at the same session of the Board at which it was introduced, but the same shall lie over for consideration at the next regular adjourned or special session of the Board.

Rule 13. No mention, other than the receiving of petitions, remonstrations, communications, claims, and the reference of the same to appropriate Committees or to adjourn shall be acted upon in the absence of any committee in the regular discharge of their duty unless such motion had been made at a previous meeting and a special assignment had for its consideration.

Rule 14. No report or resolution appropriating any money shall be acted upon until the next day after presentation without permission of a majority of the members elected.

Rule 15. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts Rules of Order shall govern in all cases where they are applicable.

Rule 16. Any of the foregoing rules, except Rules 10 and 12 may be rescinded, changed or suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

Rule 17. Rules Nos. 10 and 12 may be rescinded, altered or suspended by a two-thirds vote of all the members entitled to seats on the County Board.

Rule 18. The Committee on Equalization shall render their report immediately after roll call on the first day of the session but said report shall not be acted upon on the day which it is presented.

Rule 19. The Chairman shall appoint two or more members of the Board, who shall visit the County Hospital and Home any time within one month after their appointment and file their written report as to the condition found after their visit. And for each succeeding month thereafter a like committee shall be appointed whose duties shall be the same as the first committee, but no member shall be appointed on such committee oftener than once in twelve months. the compensation to be \$5.00 per visit in full for said trip.

Rule 20. No informal ballot cast by this Board shall be declared a formal ballot. In no case shall any official be elected by this Board by casting a unanimous vote in favor of any candidate or nominee.

Rule 21. The Board shall meet in regular session on the third Tuesday of January of each year.

Rule 22. All officers elected by the County Board except those elected at the April session, shall be nominated and all nominations lay over to the following day before they are voted on.

### **DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

#### **Duties of the County Highway Committee**

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. The County Highway Committee shall have supervision over the maintenance and construction of all roads and bridges as provided by the statutes and shall submit to the County Board an annual report including the report of the County Highway Committee of all receipts and expenditures in the County Highway Department and shall submit an annual budget and recommendations for the tax levy for road and bridge purposes to the County Board at the annual session and any other duties as outlined in the statutes or as directed by County Board Action.

2. The County Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the Iowa County Traffic Department.

3. The Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the operation of the County Ambulance.

#### **Duties of the Sheriff's Committee**

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. The Sheriff's Committee shall examine all accounts and claims filed against the County by the Sheriff and his deputies, and make report to the County Board at each regular meeting thereof.

2. The Sheriff's Committee shall also have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the county police radio system, and shall act upon such other matters as may be referred to it by the County Board.

#### **Duties of the Resolution Committee**

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To receive and examine all resolutions from without the County and make report thereof to the County Board.

#### **Duties of the General Claims Committee**

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To audit, allow or disallow all claims filed in the office of the County Clerk or referred to the committee, and shall file a schedule of such claims allowed, with the County Clerk, for payment and shall make a report to the County Board of all claims audited.

#### **Duties of the Equalization Committee**

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To have supervision over and make an equalization of the assessments on all property in the county for taxes between the several towns, villages and cities of the county.

2. It shall be the duty of this committee to make a detailed report thereof at the annual session of the board.

3. This committee shall meet annually with the Supervisor of Assessments and County Assessors at their spring meeting.



### **Duties of the Tax Claims Committee**

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To consider, examine and report to the county board, its findings in all matters of illegal assessments, tax titles and delinquent lands that may come before the board for action.
2. To supervise all delinquent taxes returned to the County, supervise the taking of tax deeds, supervise the sale of real estate taken on tax deed to the end that property is returned to the tax roll and aid in the collection of delinquent taxes. Where the value of the property involved warrants it the Committee shall have the power to appraise the property and in its discretion insure it for the benefit of the County.
3. To make appraisals pursuant to Chapter 75.69 of the county owned tax deed lands.
4. To sell and dispose to the best interests of the county those lands to which the county has taken tax deeds.
5. To employ the services of the county surveyor to establish the location of county owned property when necessary.
6. To authorize and recommend the county treasurer at their discretion to assign to heirs, mortgages or adjacent property owners, tax certificates purchased by the county at the annual sale of tax certificates.

### **Duties of the Finance Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To prepare and present to the County Board at the Annual Session the Budget and Tax Levy; first in a temporary form, and finally in a complete form as changed during the County Board Session.
2. To report upon all resolutions and petitions for appropriations presented to the Board.
3. To report and make recommendations on the finances of the County from time to time when required.

### **Duties of the Bonds and Salaries Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To recommend to the County Board the compensation of County officers and employees.
2. To determine the amount of Bonds to be furnished by the County officers to the County and to report on the sufficiency of such bonds.
3. To designate and report to the County Board the Banks of Iowa County that may apply as a depository for county funds.

### **Duties of Agricultural Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To perform all duties prescribed by law as further instructed by the County Board.

The general duty of the Committee is to protect and enhance the financial interest of the county in all things agricultural.

This committee, working in conjunction with state and federal authorities shall according to statute, enter into, consummate and cancel contracts with all extension workers and be the authority in the matter of policy of the extension office.

This committee shall bring before the proper committee requests for appropriations for fiscal years, listing the salaries and estimated expense of each department of extension work.

The Agricultural Committee shall examine and approve all claims filed against Iowa County by the Extension Department.

The Agricultural Committee has in the past requested the assistance of agricultural leaders of the county in the formation of an agricultural program for the year. This privilege is to continue.

When a county becomes a soil conservation district, the Agricultural Committee automatically, becomes supervisor of said district and must sign all contracts with those who enter into soil conservation contracts.

The Agricultural Committee shall act in an advisory capacity on all agricultural appropriations unless otherwise instructed by the County Board.

#### **Duties of Personnel Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To set the policy of each department when not in conflict with the Statutes or when called upon for this purpose, also to designate the duties and responsibilities of the different offices.

2. To hear and consider grievances reported by county departments, county officers and county employees and to make their recommendations to the County Board.

3. All matters pertaining to clerk hire, working hours and conditions, departmental problems or questions shall be referred to this committee.

4. To meet annually not later than October 15 of each year.

**Duties of Committee on Clerk's, Treasurer's and Highway Accounts**  
It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To meet with the State Auditors to study and examine the report on the accounts of the County Clerk, County Treasurer and Highway Department, and to make a report to the County Board.

2. To audit the accounts of the Justices of Iowa County as provided by the Wisconsin Statutes.

3. To approve the reports of the County Clerk and County Treasurer before being presented to the County Board.

**Duties of Committee on District Attorney, Register of Deeds and Clerk of Courts Accounts**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To approve the reports of the District Attorney, Register of Deeds and Clerk of Courts.

**Duties of Public Property Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To supervise and have charge of the Courthouse, County Jail, and the grounds of these buildings and the Gov. Dodge home site.
2. To keep in repair and good condition these properties.
3. In order to maintain uniformity of equipment, the Public property Committee shall purchase the equipment for all the offices in the Courthouse with the following exceptions — no office equipment shall be purchased for the County Agent's office, Welfare office or Highway Department, except when such purchases are made from the General Fund.
4. This Committee shall function during the year and when the County Board is not in session.

**Duties of County Superintendent of Schools Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To act as an advisory committee on all matters pertaining to the office of the County Superintendent of Schools, excepting those duties governed by statute.
2. To check the Superintendent's accounts and make recommendations to the board in matters of expense and appropriation.

**Duties of the Committee on County Hospital and Home**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To examine the accounts of the Hospital and Home.
2. To compare the vouchers as filed with the County Clerk with the records of the institutions and to compare the revenues received at the Hospital and Home with the receipts issued by the County Treasurer.
3. To act as an advisory committee with the Board of Trustees in the maintenance, repairs and construction of buildings.
4. To report to the County Board, but in no way interfere with the management of the Hospital and Home by the Board of Trustees as established by law.

**Duties of the Printing Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To accept bids on the printing of the County Board Proceedings, stationery and envelopes for county officers and Court Calendars.
2. To act on all matters of printing referred to them by the County Board.

**Duties of Conservation Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To audit the accounts of any money appropriated by the County Board for conservation work.

2. To supervise the purchase of equipment and supplies in which the money appropriated by the County Board is used.

3. To have charge of and advise the Iowa County Board of all matters relative to conservation of the natural resources of the county and to cooperate with all county, state and federal organizations in the development of the same.

#### **Duties of Highway Study Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To receive all petitions referred to it by the County Board, by the regular highway committee and any citizen group relating to the construction, relocation, maintenance and repairs of any Federal, State or County road in the county and report their recommendations to the next meeting of the County Board.

2. To confer with the regular Highway Committee on all allocations and grants of Federal and State funds and on any other highway matters of major importance.

3. This committee is merely advisory.

#### **Duties of the Health Committee**

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To act in an advisory capacity with the County Nurse on all types of health programs.

2. Annually plan and recommend the budget for the health program.

#### **Duties of the Iowa County Board of Public Welfare**

1. At the first meeting of such board, elect from their numbers, a chairman, a secretary, and such other officers as they deem necessary. Vacancies in such offices shall be filled for the unexpired terms. The chairman shall preside at all meetings when present, and shall countersign all actions taken by the board. In case of the absence of a chairman for any meeting the members present shall choose a temporary chairman.

2. Appoint a county director of public welfare subject to the provisions of s. 49.50 (2) to (5) and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.

3. Supervise the working of the county department of public welfare and shall be a policy-making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing the administration of the functions, duties and powers assigned to said department under s. 46.22 (4) and (5).

4. Whenever it determines that there is a need therefor, appoint committees consisting of residents of the county, which committee shall advise with the board on any matter for which they are created, but members of such committees shall serve without compensation.

5. Consult with the county director of public welfare concerning the preparation of the annual budget, the annual report of the county department of public welfare and the appointment of necessary personnel.

Union Agreement (No. 3) was presented to the Board and laid over.

Original Agreement adopted July 11, 1963 and printed with proceedings is not changed — for Section 1 thru 6, 8, 10 (now numbered 11) 11 (now numbered 12).

Amendments are as follows:

#### SECTION VII — Holidays

A. Each employee upon the completion of his probationary period shall be granted the following holidays off with pay or compensatory time off as outlined in subsection B. below: (1) New Years Day, (2) Memorial Day, (3) 4th of July, (4) Labor Day, (5) Thanksgiving Day, and (6) Christmas Day, and one-half day on Good Friday and beginning the year of 1966; (7) Veterans Day. If any of the above mentioned holidays fall on a Sunday, the following Monday



shall be deemed the holiday. If the holiday falls on a Saturday, the Friday before or the Monday following the holiday shall, in the discretion of the Employer be declared the holiday.

B. If any employee receiving an hourly rate of pay is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid at his straight time rate of pay for all the time worked on such holiday in addition to holiday pay. If an employee receiving a monthly salary is required to work on a holiday he shall receive compensatory time off equal to the time actually worked by such employee on the holiday in lieu of additional compensation. Employees entitled to compensatory time off under this section may be required to request such time off at least one week in advance to the Highway Commissioner. Compensatory time off must be used within six months from date of the holiday.

#### SECTION IX — Sick Leave

A. Each full time employee shall earn and accumulate when not used one sick leave day with pay for each month or major fraction thereof of employment until a total of sixty (60) days has been accumulated.

B. Sick leave pay shall begin on the first day of absence and notice must be given prior to the regular starting time if at all possible for the employee to do so. Any employee off from work without a written leave of absence in excess of three working days shall support his claim for sick leave benefits by satisfactory evidence that he was under a doctor's care while absent.

C. In the event of serious illness or death in an employee's immediate family, absence up to and including three days will be allowed without loss of pay.

D. In the event of a death of an employee of the Iowa County Highway Department, all employees covered by this agreement shall be allowed one-half day off to attend the funeral without loss of pay.

#### SECTION X — Insurance

The employer agrees to pay the employee's share of premium or one-half of the employee and dependant's share whichever is greater, for a group hospital and surgical insurance plan which shall be made a part of this agreement by reference. The terms, conditions and coverage of such plan to be negotiated between the parties from time to time as the need arises except that the group plan shall not be changed more than once per year under normal conditions.

#### SECTION XIII — Alteration - Limitation and Duration

A. This agreement may be amended any time during its life upon the mutual consent of the Employer and the Union.

B. Neither party to this agreement by such act at any time hereto and subsequently thereof agrees to, or does waiver any rights possessed by it, or them, under State or Federal Laws, regulations or Statutes.

C. This agreement shall be effective as of January 1, 1965, and shall remain in full force and effect through December 31, 1966 and shall automatically renew itself from year to year thereafter until such time that either party desiring to alter, amend, or otherwise change this agreement, serves written notice upon the other not later than September 1, 1966 or the first day of September of any year thereafter. Only amendments or changes that are stated in the written notice or notices may be subject to re-negotiations.

It is further agreed that requests for wage increases and fringe benefits which substantially effect the employer's budgeting shall

be made by August 1st of any year. Such changes agreed to shall not be effective prior to the beginning of the next contract year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State Highway Commission be and is hereby petitioned, upon the filing of a request therefor by the County Highway Committee of this county, which said Committee is hereby authorized to file, to transfer to or between any such previously authorized or additional needed construction improvements in this county, any funds allotted by the State under the provisions of Section 84.03(3), Wisconsin Statutes, and previously allocated to any other improvement or remaining unallocated in reserve.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 10

#### COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1965

SECTION I. The County Board of Supervisors of Iowa County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work in the year 1965 under the provisions of Section 20.420 and Chapter 83 of the Statutes, and the additional sums herein appropriated, shall be expended as hereinafter set forth,

SECTION II. COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY ALLOTMENT. WHEREAS the State Highway Commission has notified the County Clerk that a sum of money estimated to be Two hundred ten thousand three hundred dollars (\$210,300.00) will become available at the end of the fiscal year under the provisions of Sections 83.10 and 20.420 (83) and (84) of the Statutes, for the county trunk highway system in the county, but the actual amount will not be known until the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Committee is authorized and directed to expend the said sum to the extent required to match and supplement Federal aid for construction, right of way, and other costs on any Federal projects located on the county trunk highway system of said county, which are not recov-

ered from Federal funds, and to expend any balance for constructing, repairing, and maintaining such county trunk highway system and the bridges thereon, including snow and ice removal and control, as directed in Section 83.10(1) of the Statutes, and to reimburse the general fund for any expenditures that may be made therefrom pursuant to Section 83.01(6) of the Statutes.

SECTION III. WHEREAS it appears that certain additional highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted,

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums for the purpose hereinafter set forth,

(1) For the maintenance of the County Trunk Highway System the sum of Two Hundred Forty Five Thousand Dollars (\$245,000.00).

(2) For emergency road or bridge repairs or construction, the necessity for which is determined by the County Highway Committee and for which other funds are not available, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00).

(3) For the purchase of machinery and for machinery repairs the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00). Received from machinery rental.

(4) For the purchase of county gravel pits and stone quarries the sum received from the sale of materials.

(5) For administration, including salaries, per diem, officer and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00).

Total authorized in this Section ----- \$279,000.00

SECTION IV. WHEREAS appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts to be received from the state and available for work in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes,

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the county to meet such appropriations as follows:

(1) For the various purposes as set forth in Section III hereof the sum of Two Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Dollars (\$279,000.00).

WARNING: It is directed that provision for this levy shall be made in the county budget, but that this levy shall not be duplicated.

SECTION V. WHEREAS the various highway activities for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work cannot be known at the time of making the appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropriation for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed may be used by the County Highway Committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement, which is part of the same item in the county budget, for which provision is herein made, and any balances remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year.

SECTION VI. WHEREAS the exact amount of the funds that will become available from the state for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes will not be known until on or after June 30, 1965.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments for the purposes for which such funds are to be used, as hereinbefore authorized, from any funds in



the county treasury that are not required for the purposes for which appropriated prior to August 1, 1965, and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the sums received under Section 20.420 of the Statutes.

SECTION VII.—WHEREAS the County Highway Committee and the County Highway Commissioner are charged with the duty and responsibility of carrying out the construction and maintenance of highways for which provision is made, and other related supervisory and administrative duties,

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Commissioner shall have authority to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate such personnel as he deems necessary for such purposes, provided however that the County Highway Committee may by action recorded in its minutes determine the number of persons to be hired and may also at any time by action so recorded order the County Highway Commissioner, to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate any such person. The term "personnel" or "person" shall include all patrolmen, laborers, foremen, clerks, stenographers, or other employees necessary to carry on such activities.

We have endeavored to maintain our high standard of construction to meet the increasing demands of the public and the heavier traffic loads.

The combined committees approve and recommend to the Iowa County Board the following Highway Program for 1965 on Federal Aid and direct county funds.

1—C.T.H. "A" Jct. C.T.H. "G" to C.T.H. "J" 4.276 miles single aggregate bituminous surface - Estimated cost to Co. \$17,000 F.A.S.

2—C.T.H. "B" Jct. U. S. 151 3.4 miles, Complete base single aggregate bituminous surface ————— \$27,000.00

3—C.T.H. "DD" Jct. S.T.H. 39 East 1.2 miles, Single aggregate bituminous surface ————— \$8,000.00

4—C.T.H. "I" Jct. S.T.H. 80 to Pompey's Pillar Bridge 3.6 miles. Grade and base. Estimated Reverted F.A.S. funds available for this project to be matched by county. County to pay all of right of way and fences.

5—C.T.H. "N" Jct. C.T.H. "NN" to Jct. C.T.H. "I" 4.39 miles if additional reverted F.A.S. funds are available. Grade and base.

6—C.T.H. "C" Jct. S.T.H. 130 to Jct. S.T.H. 23 partial limited construction. Grade and base to be done by county forces and county funds.

7—C.T.H. "T" Duesler Bridge and relocation. Buckingham Bridge and relocation. Additional grade and base if funds are available.

Dodgeville, Wisconsin, November 10, 1964

To the Iowa County Board of Supervisors:

Whereas, Section 41.01 (5) and 41.19 (1a) of the Wisconsin Statutes provides that the secretary of each local board of vocational and adult education and school for handicapped children shall file with the clerk of each county and municipality from which any tuition pupil was admitted a statement setting forth his place of residence, name, age, date of entrance, the number of days of attendance and the total tuition charge for each student, and

Whereas, the Board of Vocational and Adult Education of the City of Madison, has filed a statement as required by Section 41.19 (1a) with the County Clerk of Iowa County in the amount of \$9,104.75, and

Whereas, the Deaf Dept. and Crippled Childrens Dept., Board of Education, City of Madison, Wisconsin has filed a statement as required by 40.01 (5) with the County Clerk of Iowa County in an amount of \$951.04, and

Whereas Section 41.19 (1ac) provides that such tuition is a charge and levied against all property in the county which is not in a vocational school district, and

Whereas, Section 41.01 (5) provides that such tuition is a charge and levied against all that property in the county which is not in a district operating a school for handicapped children,

Whereas, no part of Iowa County is in a vocational school district or a district for handicapped children.

Federal Aid Highway Act of 1964

Under the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1964, Federal Aid secondary highway funds will be available to Wisconsin in the amount of approximately \$7,207,143 for each of the fiscal years 1966 and 1967.

The plan for the distribution and administration of the Federal Aid secondary funds becoming available to Wisconsin under the

Federal Aid Highway Act of 1964 is outlined in the accompanying statement. The provisions of the plan were discussed with Mr. A. J. Thelen, Executive Secretary of the Wisconsin County Boards Association and the officers of the county highway commissioners and county highway committee members associations at a meeting held in Madison on December 2 1964. The plan was approved as presented at this meeting.

The 1964 Act Federal Aid secondary funds apportioned for your county for the two fiscal years 1966 and 1967 are as follows:

**County — Iowa**

Total 2-Year Apportionment ----- \$126,800.00

These funds may, within the time limitation provided in the accompanying statement, be matched by your county and used on qualifying improvements requested by your county on county trunks or local roads or streets located on the Federal Aid Secondary Highway System or its extensions in urban areas.

In planning the utilization of Federal Aid secondary funds, due consideration should be given to qualifying improvements on the F.A.S. System or extensions thereof in cities and villages and to qualifying and desirable extensions of rural improvements into such municipalities.

It need not be construed that the 2-year apportionment of Federal Aid secondary funds must be spread over a 2-year period. Within certain limits, which can be determined only after the total program of all counties is known, up to a total of a county's 2-year apportionment may be used in one year. Requests for the programming of projects using 1964 Act funds hereby apportioned may be filed at once.

The Commission's District Engineer and the District Engineer of Secondary Roads will discuss with your county highway committee your potential Federal Aid secondary program, and your county, through your county highway committee, is requested to work with them in developing a proposed program of improvements on the Federal Aid Secondary System to utilize the funds apportioned to your county. The program requests by your county highway committee, submitted through the district office, will be subject to review by the Commission.

Gentlemen:

We have prepared the following report on forest fires burning in that part of Iowa County that is in Forest Protection District No. 12 during the year of 1964. This report is for your information and consideration.

The 1964 season was very long with fire weather starting on February 1 and ending with snowfall on November 20. There were

long periods of warm and dry weather which resulted in some very dry fuel conditions and made fires very hard to control.

There were a total of 17 fires occurring during 1964, burning over a total of 1,337 acres. This includes 85 acres of forest land, 21 acres of cropland and 1,231 acres of non-forest, consisting of brush, grass and marshland. Most of the non-forest land burned resulted from three fires burning in the Avoca marsh.

Following is a breakdown of the fire cause and acres burned.

No. of Fires	Cause	Acres Burned
9	Miscellaneous	1,253
7	Debris Burning	82
1	Smoking	2

The fact that the number of fires diminished from 37 in 1963 to 17 in 1964 indicates to us an increase in awareness of fire potential by the general public. Local fire departments and law enforcement officials play a large part in the prevention and suppression of fires. This continued cooperation is necessary and will tend to lower the damage caused by forest fires in years to come.

This report includes all the expenditures for the categorical aids, such as Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to Dependent Children in Foster Homes, Aid to the Totally and Permanently disabled, Blind Aid, and for General Relief and Administration.

The Iowa County Public Welfare Department is very appreciative of the fine cooperation that we have received from the Iowa County Board of Supervisors, Iowa County Officials, the Iowa County Medical Society, the Dodgeville Hospitals, the Iowa County Home, Iowa County dentists, optometrists, lawyers, druggists, nursing home operators, and other professional and lay people of Iowa County with whom we came in contact during 1964. It would not have been possible for this agency to have given Iowa County the kind of efficient and business like operation, without this fine help and cooperation. At this time, we are gratefully acknowledging this tremendous help and assistance that we received.

#### OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

This continues to be the largest and most costly program of the agency. This is due, to the need for and cost of necessary medical care, for a high percentage of our Old Age Assistance recipients. They require regular and prolonged medical services, which are necessary but nevertheless costly. These aged clients live longer, as do most of the elderly population, and thus suffer the infirmities of old age.

In 1964, cash payments were made to an average of 225 persons per month. While the total number of Old Age Assistance clients continues to decline, the total cost continues to be higher, due to the cost of medical care, as previously noted. These Old Age Assistance recipients received medical care, consisting of physician's services, hospitalization, nursing home care, county home care, drugs, dental care, optometrical services, chiroprapist treatment, home care, etc. When the cost of these services increase, the assistance payments for medical care, increase accordingly.

The Federal reimbursement for each Old Age Assistance case continues to be \$55.25 per month. The State reimbursement continues to be 30 per cent for cash payments and 50 per cent for vendor medical payments, after deducting the Federal Aid received for such care.

**AID TO DEPENDENT CHILDREN**

The second largest program in regard to cost, continues to be the Aid to Dependent Children program. In 1964, Iowa County provided care for a monthly average of 37 individual cases, involving an average of 99 children. Included in this total are the foster home care cases. There was a monthly average of 19 children in foster home care. The number of Aid to Dependent Children and Aid to Dependent Children cases in Foster Homes cases continues to be relatively stable.

The Federal reimbursement per eligible recipient count in Aid to Dependent Children continues to be \$20.825, for most recipients. The State reimbursement continues to be 33½ per cent for money payments and 35 per cent for vendor medical payments, after deduction of the Federal aid received for such care.

The agency has had an average of three children in foster homes this year, who are eligible for Federal matching. This amounts to 100 per cent reimbursement, for these cases.

**AID TO THE TOTALLY AND PERMANENTLY DISABLED**

The second largest program, in regard to the number of cases, is the Disabled Aid caseload. Due to the increased costs for Disabled Aid, it was necessary, in July 1964 to have \$4,000.00 transferred from the Old Age Assistance account to the Disabled Aid account. This program exceeded the Aid to Dependent Children in 1964. Due to the continued number of cases in the Iowa County Home, who need financial aid, the number of Disabled Aid cases has continued to increase. There are a number of former General Relief cases that

qualified for and are currently receiving Aid to the Disabled grants, due to permanent physical and mental disabilities, or a combination of both. Due to the number of current applications, the number of such cases will continued to increase in 1965. The average monthly caseload in 1964 was 40 cases, an increase of 11 cases per month more than in 1963.

The Federal reimbursement for each Disabled Aid case continues to be \$47.375 per month. The State reimbursement is 30 per cent on money payments and 35 per cent on vendor medical payments, after deduction of the Federal aid received for such care.

#### GENERAL RELIEF

The Iowa County expenditures for General Relief were higher in 1964. There were several reasons for this; the major ones being higher medical costs, seasonal layoffs and lack of employment for for a number of relief recipients. The Soldiers and Sailors Relief Account was depleted early in 1964, which necessitated this agency granting financial aid to needy veterans. The relief costs from January 1, 1964 to December 31, 1964 amounted to \$23,179.60. The refunds received during this period amounted to \$3,043.22. The average monthly cost, during this period, amounted to \$1,931.63. The Relief costs for 1964 were \$5,198.03 higher than they were in 1963.

As in previous years, a number of cases qualified for Disabled Aid and Old Age Assistance and were thus taken off the Relief rolls. This agency has continued to make every effort possible to locate



employment for unemployed able-bodied men. If unable to locate jobs for them, due to lack of work skills, education and mentality, referrals are made to the State Vocational Rehabilitation Consultant, who comes to the agency, on a monthly basis. Due to the limited number of able-bodied men, requesting financial aid, there has been no one referred to the Iowa County Work Relief Project for some time now. However, if such men did apply for General Relief and needed aid for an extended period, they would be referred to this project. This consists of working out the amount of financial aid received, with the Iowa County Highway Department.

The monthly statistics on General Relief in Iowa County, as compiled by the Wisconsin State Department of Public Welfare, Bureau of Research, are as follows:

#### AGENCY ADMINISTRATION

The cost of Administration is the expense of operating the Iowa County Public Welfare Department. This includes the salaries and travel of the agency staff, per diem and travel of the County Welfare Board members as well as other necessary agency expenses, such as telephone, telegrams, postage, purchase of supplies and office equipment, etc. Since the agency has had to add a Caseworker I and part-time typist to the staff, due to the greater volume of work, required services, etc., the cost of Administration was greater in 1964. The agency is now administering the Health Assistance Payments Act, which went into effect state-wide in July, 1964. This, along with required social studies and service visits, necessitated more



clerical and casework efforts, on the part of the agency staff. The agency now has ten members, as compared to eight in 1963. There was additional office space obtained, which was greatly needed. The Director now occupies the library room of the Iowa County Superintendent of Schools and two caseworkers now occupy the room formerly used by the Director.

The agency receives up to 75 per cent State and Federal reimbursement, for all service cases, for Administrative staff working in service program. We receive 100 per cent reimbursement for Administrative time spent on the Health Assistance Payment Act cases. As of July 1, 1964, the agency began receiving 45 per cent reimbursement, on the salary of the agency's Child Welfare Worker, instead of 25 per cent.

Since the reports on Administration, from the Wisconsin State Department of Public Welfare, Division of Public Assistance, are two months in arrears, we are estimating the reimbursement from the State and Federal Governments, for the months of November and December 1964, in order to have a total report of expenditures for the year.

2. Attached hereto, marked Exhibit A, and made a part hereof, is the annual report of the operations of the Southwestern Wisconsin Fair Association for the year 1964.

3. Premiums paid this year amounted to \$7,676.00. State Aid of \$4,799.73 was received. The total state aid applied for was reduced 7.8% or \$406.05 due to a shortage of funds available for this purpose. In analyzing the premiums paid \$4,809.00 or 62.6% was paid to Junior Fair Exhibitors, the balance \$2,867.00 to Open Class Exhibitors. The share of the state aid received applicable to Junior Fair premiums was \$3,004.80, leaving a balance of \$1,804.20 to be paid out of county aid.

4. Of the cash on hand in this report, the sum of \$4,080.00 is on certificate of deposit at the Farmers Savings Bank, Mineral Point, Wisconsin. This is the basis for a fund to be used in the repairs or erection of a new exhibit building. Of this sum, \$1000.00 was allocated from county aid.

5. This year, as in the past, no charges were made of Junior Fair Exhibitors or Junior Fair Leaders for admission to the grounds, nor were there any charges made Junior Fair Exhibitors for stall rent. To our knowledge this is the only Fair in our section of the State that does not charge Junior Fair Exhibitors either an entrance fee or stall rent. The Fair considers the value of the approximately one thousand one hundred Junior Fair Exhibitors and Leader tickets to have a value of, at least \$2.00 each so that \$2200.00 was allocated from county aid to cover these tickets.

6. There was no county aid used for Junior Fair Judges or book-keeping expense.
