SESSIONS of 1966

RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE IOWA CO. BOARD

- Rule 1. The hour of meeting shall be 10:00 o'clock a.m. and 2 o'clock p.m., unless a different hour shall be prescribed.
- Rule 2. The Chairman shall call the meeting to order at the hour fixed for the meeting. (1) The clerk shall call the roll of members and (2) a majority being present, the journal of the preceding meeting. if printed copies are not available, shall be read, that any mistakes may be corrected. Minutes shall be read at the close of each session. (3) Motions may be offered.
- Rule. 3. The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum, and may speak on points of order in preference to other members.
- Rule 4. The Board shall elect at the April meeting in even numbered years, a chairman and also a vice-chairman who shall serve for a two year term. The vice-chairman shall act in the absence, disability, death or resignation of the chairman or on a request to act and possess powers of the chairman.
- Rule 5. The chairman and the vice-chairman shall make committee appointments.
- Rule 6. All questions shall be stated by the chair. If the chairman doubts as to the voice of the majority he or any member of the Board may call for a vote by either roll call or rising vote on the question to be decided.
- Rule 7. The following standing committees shall be appointed: Committee on Claims Audit Printing and Property, Committee on Salary and Personnel, Committee on Finance Equalization Bonds and Insurance, Committee on Agriculture, Committee on Health Education and Institutions, Committee on Tax Claims Addressograph and Veterans Office, Committee on Courts Justice and Law Enforcement. Committee on Civil Defense, Committee on Rural Planning, Committee on Resource Development, Additional statutory committees to be elected are: Committee on Welfare, Committee on Highway. The size of committees shall be limited to not less than three nor more than five members. No member of the Highway Committee may serve on any other committee of the County Board unless specifically so directed to serve by Statutes.
- Rule 8. After the journal shall have been read the order of business shall be as follows: 1. Letters, Petitions, Remonstrations, Communications and Accompanying Documents. 2. Resolutions. 3. Reports of committees, first standing and afterwards, special committees. 4. Miscellaneous business.
- Rule 9. Every member present shall vote unless excused by the chairman.
- Rule 10. Every vote taken in regard to levying taxes, appropriating money, or dividing or altering the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be taken by Yeas and Nays, and the same shall be entered on the journal.
- Rule 11. The Yeas and Nays on any question shall be entered on the journal at the request of one of the members present.
- Rule 12. No petitions, resolutions or motions having for its object the division or alteration of the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be entered on or considered at the same session of the Board at which it was introduced, but the same shall lie over for consideration at the next regular adjourned or special session of the Board.

Rule 13. Each member prior to speaking shall rise and address himself to and be recognized by the chair. If two or more members arise at the same time the chairman shall decide who shall speak first but in all other cases the member who arises and addresses the chair first shall have the preference.

Rule 14. No mention, other than the receiving of petitions, remonstrations, communications, claims, and the reference of the same to appropriate committees or to adjourn shall be acted upon in the absence of any committee in the regular discharge of their duty unless such motion had been made at a previous meeting and a special assignment had for its consideration.

Rule 15. No report or resolution appropriating any money shall be acted upon until the next day after presentation without permission of two-thirds of the members present.

Rule 16. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts Rules of Order shall govern in all cases where they are applicable.

Rule 17. Any of the foregoing rules, except Rules 10 and 12 may be rescinded, changed or suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

Rule 18. Rules Nos. 10 and 12 may be rescinded, altered or suspended by a two-thirds vote of all the members entitled to seats on the County Board.

Rule 19. The Committee on Equalization shall render their report immediately after roll call on the first day of the session but said report shall not be acted upon on the day which it is presented.

Rule 20. Every two months the chairman shall appoint three members of the Board who shall visit the County Hospital and Home within two months after their appointment and file their written report as to the condition found after their visit. No member shall be appointed on such committee oftener than once in 12 months, Compensation of \$5.00 as full payment shall be allowed per visit.

Rule 21. No informal ballot cast by this Board shall be declared a formal ballot. In no case shall any official be elected by this Board by casting a unanimous vote in favor of any candidate or nominee.

Rule 22. The Board shall meet in February, July and October in addition to the April and November Sessions.

Rule 23. All officers elected by the County Board except those elected at the April session, shall be nominated and all nominations lay over to the following day before they are voted on.

Rule 24. All resolutions or petitions to be presented to a session of the County Board shall be presented 10 days in advance of the scheduled session and a report or copy shall be mailed to each County Supervisor. An emergency situation may grant an exception provided approval is given by 2/3 of the membership.

Rule 25. All purchases for the courthouse, courthouse annex, and jail shall be channeled through the Purchasing Committee.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Committee on Claims - Audit - Printing and Property

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To audit, allow or disallow all claims filed in the office of the county clerk or referred to the committee, and shall file a schedule of such claims allowed with the county clerk for payment and shall make a report to the County Board of all claims audited.
- To meet with the State Auditors to study and examine the report on the accounts covered in their audit and make a report of the findings to the County Board.
- To approve the reports of the county clerk, county treasurer, district attorney. register of deeds and clerk of courts before such reports are presented to the County Board.
- 4. To accept bids on the printing of the County Board proceedings, stationery, envelopes and general printing for county officers and offices and court calendars.
- To act on all matters of printing referred to them by the County Board or any department of the county.
- To supervise and have charge of the courthouse, courthouse annex, county jail and the grounds of these buildings and the Gov. Dodge home site.
 - 7. To keep in repair and good condition these properties.
- 8. In order to maintain uniformity of equipment, this committee shall purchase the equipment for all offices in the courthouse, courthouse annex and jail with the following exception no office equipment shall be purchased for the Highway Department, except when such purchases are made from the general fund or a mutual agreement on cost savings can be reached, through volume purchases of miscellaneous supplies.
- This committee shall function during the year and when the County Board is not in session.

Committee on Welfare

It Shall Be the Duty of This Board:

- 1. At the first meeting of such board, elect from their numbers, a chairman, a secretary, and such other officers as they deem necessary. Vacancies in such offices shall be filled for the unexpired terms. The chairman shall preside at all meetings when present, and shall countersign all actions taken by the board. In case of the absence of a chairman for any meeting the members present shall choose a temporary chairman.
- 2. Appoint a county director of public welfare subject to the provisions of s. 49.50 (2) to (5) and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.
- 3. Supervise the working of the county department of public welfare and shall be the policy-making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing the administration of the functions, duties and powers assigned to said department under s. 46.22 (4) and (5).
- 4. Whenever it determines that there is a need therefor. appoint committees consisting of residents of the county, which committee shall advise with the board on any matter for which they are created, but members of such committees shall serve without compensation.
- Consult with the county director of public welfare concerning the preparation of the annual budget, the annual report of the county department of public welfare and the appointment of necessary personnel.

Committee on Highway

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. The County Highway Committee shall have supervision over the maintenance and construction of all roads and bridges as provided by statutes and shall submit to the County Board an annual report including the report of the County Highway Committee of all receipts and expenditures in the County Highway Department and shall submit an annual budget and recommendations for the tax levy for road and bridge purposes to the County Board at the annual session and any other duties as outlined in the statutes or as directed by County Board action.
- The County Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the Iowa County Traffic Department.
- The Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the operation of the county ambulance.

Committee on Salary and Personnel

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To set the policy of each department not in conflict with the Statutes or when called upon for this purpose, also to designate the duties and responsibilities of the different offices.
- 2. To hear and consider the grievances reported by county departments, county offficers and county employees and to make their recommendations to the County Board after sufficient consideration with the committee responsible.
- 3. To meet at least annually not later than October 15th of each year.
- 4. To recommend to the County Board the compensation of all county officers and employees.
- 5. To receive from all other committees responsible for hiring employees, all matters pertaining to clerk hire, salary, working hours and conditions and departmental problems.

Committee on Finance - Equalization - Bonds and Insurance It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To prepare and present to the County Board at the annual session the budget and tax levy; first in a temporary form, and finally in a complete form as changed during the County Board session
- To report upon all resolutions and petitions for appropriations presented to the Board.
- To report and make recommendations on the finances of the county from time to time when required,
- 4. To have supervision over and make an equalization of the assessments on all property in the county for taxes between the several towns, villages and cities of the county.
- 5. To report in detail on the equalization report at the annual session of the board.
- To meet annually with the supervisor of assessments and county assessors at their spring meeting.
- To determine the amounts of bonds to be furnished by the county officers to the county and to report on the sufficiency of such bonds.
- To designate and report to the county board the banks of Iowa county that may apply as a depository for county funds.

9. To have charge of all county insurance.

Committee on Agriculture

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To perform all duties prescribed by law as further instructed by the County Board.
- The general duty of the committee is to protect and enhance the financial interest of the county in all things agricultural.
- 3. This committee, working in conjunction with state and federal authorities shall according to statute, enter into, consummate and cancel contracts with all extension workers and be the authority in the matter of policy of the extension office.
- 4. This committee shall bring before the proper committee requests for appropriations for fiscal years, listing the salaries and estimated expense of each department of extension work.
- To examine and approve all claims filed against Iowa county by the Extension Department.
- 6. The committee has in the past requested the assistance of agricultural leaders of the county in the formation of an agricultural program for the year. This privilege is to continue.
- 7. As the county is a soil conservation district, the committee automatically serves as supervisor of said district and must sign all contracts with those who enter into soil conservation contracts.
- To act in an advisory capacity on all agricultural appropriations unless otherwise instructed by the County Board.

Committee on Health - Education and Institutions It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To examine the accounts of the Hospital and Home.
- 2. To act as an advisory committee with the Board of Trustees in the maintenance, repairs and construction of buildings.
- To report to the County Board but in no way interfere with the management of the Hospitai and Home by the Board of Trustees as established by law.
- 4. To act in an advisory capacity with the county nurse on all types of health programs, and may audit the personnel expenses.
- 5. Annually plan and recommend the budget for the health program.
- To act as a liaison committee for Iowa County regarding the participation in the Southwestern Wisconsin Library Processing Center.

Committee on Tax Claims - Addressograph and Veterans Office It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To consider, examine and report to the County Board, its findings in all matters of illegal assessments, tax titles and delinquent lands that may come before the board for action.
- 2. To supervise all delinquent taxes returned to the county, supervise the taking of tax deeds, supervise the sale of real estate taken on tax deed to the end that the property is returned to the tax roll and aid in the collection of delinquent taxes. Where the value of the property involved warrants it, the committee shall have the power to appraise the property and in its discretion insure it for the benefit of the county.
- To make appraisals pursuant to Chapter 75.69 of the county owned tax deed lands.

- To sell and dispose to the best interest of the county those lands to which the county has taken tax deeds.
- 5. To employ the services of the county surveyor to establish the location of county owned property when necessary.
- 6. To authorize and recommend the county treasurer at their discretion to assign to heirs, mortgagees or adjacent property owners, tax certificates purchased by the county at the annual sale of tax certificates.
- 7. To advise with and assist the service officer regarding his duties in compliance with Wisconsin Stautes.
 - 8. To meet as necessary.
- 9. To have charge of and supervise the operation and use of the addressograph system.

Committee on Courts - Justice and Law Enforcement

- It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:
- The committee may examine all accounts and claims filed against the county by the sheriff and his deputies, and may make a report to the County Board at any meeting thereof.
- To have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the county police radio system, and shall act upon such other matters as may be referred to it by the County Board.
- 3. To have charge of the law library in cooperation with the judges,
- 4. To consider the reports and information made available by the courts for presentation to the county board.

Committee on Civil Defense

- It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:
- 1. This committee under the direction of the County Board chairman shall to the extent of its ability carry out the duties of the Civil Defense program as covered by Wisconsin Statutes.

Committee on Rural Planning

- It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:
 - 1. To function as governed by Wisconsin Statutes.

Committee on Resource Development

- It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:
- To give assistance in an advisory capacity in so far as is possible for all resource development in Iowa County.
- To have charge of and advise with the County Board on all matters regarding airports.
- 3. To audit the accounts of any money appropriated by the County Board for conservation work.
- 4. To supervise the purchase of equipment and supplies used in association with the duties of this committee where the funds were appropriated by the County Board.
- 5. To have charge of and advise the Iowa County Board of all matters relative to conservation of the natural resources of the county and to cooperate with all county, state and federal organizaions in the development of the same.
- 6. To receive all petitions referred to it by the County Board, by the Highway Committee and any citizen group relating to the construction, relocation, maintenance and repairs of any federal, state or county road in the county and report their recommendations to the next session of the County Board.
- To confer with the Highway Committee on all allocations and grants of federal and state funds and on any other highway matters of major importance.

The Chairman declared the first ballot the informal ballot and the second ballot the formal ballot.

As a result of the election Sup. Richard Scullion was declared elected Chairman for a term of two years.

The Board then proceeded to the election of a Vice-Chairman for a term of two years.

As a result of the election Sup. A. E. Anding was declared elected Vice-Chairman for a term of two years.

The Board reviewed the rules that had governed the Iowa County Board in the past using those numbered rules as a guide in establishing the rules to govern the new Board,

Mr. John Truog of the Wisconsin Conservation Department and Mr. Fred Eckels of Mineral Point addressed the Board concerning public access to Ludden Lake in Mineral Point.

Agreement (No. 3) between Board of Directors of Grant County Guidance Center, hereafter named Board and the County of Iowa was read.

AGREEMENT

This Agreement made and entered into this 13th day of July, 1966, by and between the Board of Directors of the Grant County Guidance Center, hereafter termed Board, created by the Grant County Board of Supervisors, pursuant to the authority of the Wis-

consin Statutes, and the County of Iowa, a Municipal Corporation of the State of Wisconsin, created and existing under the laws of the State of Wisconsin.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, The Grant County Board of Supervisors by Ordinance No. 50, dated November 17, 1959, has established the Grant County Guidance Center for the purpose of instituting a mental health service program pursuant to S. 51.36, Wis. Stats., and

WHEREAS, The Grant County Board of Supervisors by Ordinance No. 55, dated February 16, 1966, has authorized the Board to extend services to all citizens of the Counties in the Comprehensive Mental Health Area - 17 on a cost per use basis, and

WHEREAS, the County of Iowa, is desirous of obtaining the services of the Grant County Guidance Center for their residents.

Therefore it is agreed by and between the parties hereto:

- The Grant County Guidance Center shall provide the following services to the residents of the County of Iowa:
- Collaborative and co-operative services with public health and other groups for programs for the prevention and treatment of mental illness, mental retardation and other psychiatric disabilities.
- (2) Rehabilitation services for patients suffering from mental or emotional disorders, mental retardation and other psychiatric conditions and particularly for those who have received prior treatment in an in-patient facility.
 - (3) Out-patient disagnostic and treatment services.
- (4) Consultative services to schools, courts and health and welfare agencies, both public and private.
- (5) Informational and educational services to the general public and lay and professional groups.
- (6) Such other services as may be within the purview of Sec. 51.36, Wis. Stats., and the rules and regulations of the State Department of Public Welfare.
- 2. The County of Iowa shall provide a representative to meet with the Board of Directors, who shall provide liaison between the Board of Directors and the Board of Supervisors of the County he represents. Such representative shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Board of Directors without the right to vote.
- 3. The services of the Grant County Guidance Center shall be rendered to those persons specified by the Medical Director of the Center to be in need of the services, without regard for the County of residence.
- 4. The cost of the services for the respective County shall be on a cost per use basis. The formula by which this is determined shall be the total expenditures of the Clinic divided by the total number of individual and group sessions plus the hours spent away from the Clinic in community services. This figure shall hereafter be termed unit cost. 60% of this figure or unit cost multiplied by the recipient County's number of individual and group sessions plus the hours spent away from the Clinic in community services in the recipient County shall be the respective County's cost. The unit cost for Grant County Guidance Center in 1965 was \$24.25 60% of which is \$14.55. The actual unit cost shall be that as determined for the year in which the service is rendered.
- 5. The County of Iowa upon entering this Agreement shall forthwith appropriate and forward to the Office of Treasurer of Grant County a sum of money which shall be computed from the 1965 unit cost and the respective County's estimated use for the remainder of 1966. The County of Iowa shall annually appropriate and forward to the Office of Treasurer of Grant County, on or before the first day of January, a sum of money which shall be com-

puted from the prior year's unit cost and the respective County's estimated use for the year beginning in January. The annual budget for the succeeding year shall be submitted to the respective County Boards on or before the 1st day of September each year. The fiscal year for the Center shall be the calendar year. At the completion of the years operation, the utilization of the Center's services by the respective Counties shall be tabulated and if the County of Iowa utilized the services of the Center in excess of the aforestated estimate, then billings for such excess usage shall be rendered to the respective County Board of Supervisors and payment thereon made to the Treasurer of Grant County, within ninety (90) days after the date rendered. If the aforestated estimate is found to be in excess of actual utilization of the Center's services, then Grant County shall render the balance to the respective County Treasurer within ninety (90) days after the date the tabulated use is rendered.

6. A fee schedule shall be established for services rendered by the Center, however, no individual shall be denied services because of inability to pay. Such fees collected from the residents of the County of Iowa shall be credited to the respective County's adjustment at the end of the year.

7. The initial terms under this Agreement shall be from the date of execution hereof, to and including December 31, 1966. Subsequent extentions, renewals or supplemental Agreements shall be for one year terms, unless otherwise agreed between the parties. In the event that State Aid shall not be available for the Center, it is hereby agreed that this Agreement shall be renegotiated at that time.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS: The Iowa County Board has appointed three representatives to study and cooperatively plan development of mental health services with Green, Lafayette, Grant and Crawford Counties in the Comprehensive Mental Health Area 17

WHEREAS: The Congress and Legislature of the State of Wisconsin have enacted into law certain measures which provide financial assistance with 40 to 75% reimbursement for comprehensive mental health centers in areas of 75,000 population which develop comprehensive mental health services, and

WHEREAS: There is a need for a comprehensive program consisting of five essential services (1) In-patient care; (2) Out-patient care; (3) Partial Hospitalization Day Care - Night Care; (4) Emergency Care; (5) Consultation and Education Programs, and

WHEREAS: In planning comprehensive mental health services for our respective counties it is recognized there is a need for coordinated mental health services including active treatment hospitals and mental health clinics, and

WHEREAS: The Grant County Board of Supervisors has voted to make the facilities of the Grant County Guidance Clinic available to the citizens of Iowa County. THEREFORE, Be it resolved that the Iowa County Board adopt agreement No. 3 hereto attached.

At the July 13th meeting of the County Board it was decided, starting at the November meeting when a Highway Commissioner is elected that instead of being nominated from the floor as has been done in the past, it will now be necessary to make an application stating certain qualifications. The Highway Committee was instructed to prepare what they deemed to be reasonable and necessary requirements as follows:

The maximum age of a starting commissioner should be 40 years.

He must have a reasonable amount of knowledge and experience to study, understand and explain maps, Right of Way plans, construction procedures, machinery, and the operation of crushing, paving, and many other duties such as administration details, consisting of office work, accurate record keeping, cost estimates, reports to the State and of Federal Aid Projects.

He must make appearances before the County Board at regular intervals in compliance with State Statutes.

He must make recommendations to the Highway Committee in order to improve the efficiency of the department.

One requirement we considered of great importance regardless of any others, he must definitely have the ability to be a good administrator, fair and impartial with all employees.

The Committee believes that the Board should feel free to add or delete as they see fit after careful consideration of these qualifications.

This agreement shall be effective as of January 1, 1967, and shall remain in full force and effect through December 31, 1967 and shall automatically renew itself from year to year thereafter until such time that either party desiring to alter, amend, or otherwise change this agreement, serves written notice upon the other not later than September 1, 1967 or the first day of September of any year thereafter.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State Highway Commission be and is hereby petitioned, upon the filing of a request therefor by the County Highway Committee of this county, which said Committee is hereby authorized to file, to transfer to or between any such previously authorized or additional needed construction improvements in this county, any funds allotted by the State under the provisions of Section 84.03(3), Wisconsin Statutes, and previously allocated to any other improvement or remaining unallocated in reserve.

COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1967

SECTION I. The County Board of Supervisors of Iowa County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work in the year 1967 under the provisions of Section 20.420 and Chapter 83 of the Statutes. and the additional sums herein appropriated, shall be expended as hereinafter set forth:

SECTION II, COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY ALLOTMENT. WHEREAS the State Highway Commission has notified the County Clerk that a sum of money estimated to be Two Hundred Twenty Seven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$227,200.00) will become available at the end of the fiscal year under the provisions of Sections 83.10 and 20.420(3) (xg) and (3)(xm) of the Statutes, for the county trunk highway system in the county, but the actual amount will not be known until the close of he fiscal year ending June 30, 1967.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Committee is authorized and directed to expend the said sum to the extent required to match and supplement Federal aid for construction, right of way, and other costs on any Federal projects located on the county trunk highway system of said county, which are not recovered from Federal funds, and to expend any balance for constructing, repairing, and maintaining such county trunk highway system and the bridges thereon, including snow and ice removal and control, as directed in Section 83.10(1) of the Statutes, and to reimburse the general fund for any expenditures that may be made therefrom pursuant to Section 83.01(6) of the Statutes.

SECTION III. WHEREAS it appears that certain additional highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums for the purpose hereinafter set forth:

For the maintenance of the County Trunk Highway System the sum of Three Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$340,000.00).

For emergency road or bridge repairs or construction, the necessity for which is determined by the County Highway Committee and for which other funds are not available, the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00).

For the purchase of machinery and for machinery repairs the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00). received from rental of machinery.

For the purchase of county gravel pits and stone quarries the sum received from sale of materials.

For administration, including salaries, per diem, officer and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00).

Total Authorized in this Section _____\$400,000.00

SECTION IV. WHEREAS appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts to be received from the state and available for work in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes,

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the county to meet such appropriations as follows:

For the various purposes as set forth in Section III hereof the sum of Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000.00).

SECTION V. WHEREAS the various highway activities for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work cannot be known at the time of making the appropriation therefor,

BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropriation for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed may be used by the County Highway Committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement, which is part of the same item in the county budget, for which provision is herein made, and any balances remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year.

SECTION VI. WHEREAS the exact amount of the funds that will become available from the state for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes will not be known until on or after June 30, 1967.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments for the purposes for which such funds are to be used, as hereinbefore authorized, from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purposes for which appropriated prior to August 1. 1967, and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the sums received under Section 20,420 of the Statutes.

SECTION VII. WHEREAS the County Highway Committee and the County Highway Commissioner are charged with the duty and responsibility of carrying out the construction and maintenance of highways for which provision is made, and other related supervisory and administrative duties,

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Commissioner shall have authority to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate such personnel as he deems necessary for such purposes, provided however that the County Highway Committee may by action recorded in its minutes determine the number of persons to be hired and may also at any time by action so recorded order the County

Highway Commissioner to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate any such person. The term "personnel" or "person" shall include all patrolmen, laborers, foremen, clerks, stenographers. or other employees necessary to carry on such activities.

We plan to apply liquid calcium chloride to more of our County gravel roads in 1967. From past experience with this treatment it not only reduces the dust to a minimum, but also is a saving on crushed rock.

Complete construction on remainder of C.T.H. "I" Pompey Pillar Cheese Factory to Jct. C.T.H. "II" with county forces and county funds. The remaining portion of C.T.H. "C" to be graded west of the F.A.S. project.

The F.A.S. portion of C.T.H. "C" to be bituminous surfaced.

Relocation of portion of C.T.H. "K" grade and base Jct. C.T.H. "DD" to Jct. C.T.H. "F".

Bituminous surfacing for section of C.T.H. "K" constructed in 1965.

Bituminous surface to be applied on C.T.H. "B" Jct. Jack Rock farm to Jct. C.T.H. "Q".

Complete gravel and base on C.T.H. "Q" Jct. S.T.H. "39" Jct. U.S.H. "18".

C.T.H. "Z" Jct. C.T.H. "ZZ" Jct. S.T.H. "23" grade and base.

C.T.H. "T" Birch Lake to Jct. C.T.H. "H" grade and base and relocation where necessary we will try to do the construction as far as possible on the 4 rod right of way.

We do not plan any construction with F.A.S. funds in 1967 except the bituminous surfacing on C.T.H. "C".

We do plan on eliminating some hazards with specially provided F.A.S. funds. The top priority on this list is the Yager bridge on C.T.H. "H" approximate total cost of this project will be \$45,000.

There are always changing conditions and emergencies which may alter our present plans.

A discussion followed on the services provided by Iowa, Lafayette, Grant and Crawford Counties participation in the library service center.

It was explained that the increase in the appropriation for the County Extension Department is partially due to the inclusion of the Farm Management Agent under the program.

Sup. Julian explained to the Board that the requested increase in Administration Account for the Welfare Department was due to the need of additional staff and to salary increases that are to be granted.

Mr. Dave Grunow, Caseworker for the Welfare Department addressed the Board and explained that a department with five caseworkers is required to hire a caseworker supervisor. He also explained his work as a case worker and the salary schedule as proposed for the welfare department employees.

County Clerk Kenneth Palzkill addressed the Board relative to the need for an equalized salary schedule,

Sup. Pustina moved the salary schedule of the Welfare Department and the County Extension Department be presented to the County Board tomorrow.

Sup. Hogan seconded the motion. Carried.

Sup. Hicks addressed the County Board on Welfare costs. He stated the county share of aids was \$103,200.00, Administration costs \$25,000.00. He stated the cost of administration to be 20c for each \$1.00 dispensed. The total case load \$496,850.00.

The rates for care of patients at County Home were discussed and it was stated the \$250.00 rate for maximum care patients with the County furnishing the medicines is costing the County Home large sums of money over and above the costs for caring for the

patients. This situation is resulting in additional appropriations by the Board to finance the operation of the Home.

Sup. Hicks addressed the Board suggesting the County Hospital & the Farm operational figures be segregated.

A discussion followed on the operation and reason for the loss in the overall institutional costs.

Mr. Dolphin spoke on the matter of success in patient release from institutional care.

Sup. Hicks moved the Hospital & Farm Accounts be recorded individually and that separate records be kept, if not in legal conflict with record keeping requirements.

Sup. Holland seconded the motion. Carried.

Sup. Stenseth advised the Board that the \$20,000.00 appropriation requested for watersheds is for completion of Twin Parks Watershed and the balance left from this appropriation to revert to the Otter Creek Watershed.

The Board discussed the renovation of the Courthouse. Mr. John Rule has been hired as architect to advise the Committee of the needed improvements.

Sup. Thompson moved \$25,500.00 be appropriated to Courthouse Outlay Account.

Sup. Reynolds seconded the motion. Carried.

Sup. Branger moved the Board go back into Regular Session.

Sup. Thompson seconded the motion. Carried.
