SESSIONS of 1974

RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE IOWA COUNTY BOARD

- Rule 1. The hour of meeting shall be 10:00 o'clock A.M. or 8:00 o'clock P.M., unless a different hour shall be prescribed.
- Rule 2. The Chairman shall call the meeting to order at the hour fixed for the meeting. (1) The clerk shall call the roll of members and (2) a majority being present, the journal of the preceding meeting, if printed copies are not available, shall be read, that any errors may be corrected.
- Rule. 3. The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum, and may speak on points of order in preference to other members.
- Rule 4. The Board shall elect at the April meeting in even numbered years, a chairman and also a vice-chairman who shall serve for a two year term. The vice-chairman shall act in the absence, disability, death or resignation of the chairman or on a request to act and possess powers of the chairman.
- Rule 5. The chairman and vice-chairman shall appoint standing committees.
- Rule 6. All questions shall be stated by the chair. If the chairman doubts as to the voice of the majority he or any members of the Board may call for a vote by either roll call or rising vote on the questions to be decided.
- Rule 7. The following standing committees shall be appointed: Committee on Claims Audit Printing and Property, Committee on Salary and Personnel, Committee on Finance Equalization-Bonds and Insurance, Committee on Agriculture, Committee on Health-Education and Institutions, Committee on Tax Claims-Addressograph and Veterans Office, Committee on Courts-Justice and Law Enforcement, Committee on Civil Defense, Committee on Rural Planning, Committee on Resource Development, Additional statutory committees to be elected are; Committee on Social Services, Committee on Highways. The size of committees shall be limited to not less than three nor more than five members. No member of the Highway Committee may serve on any other committee of the County Board unless specifically so directed to serve by Statutes.
- Rule 8. After the journal shall have been read the order of business shall be as follows: 1. Letters, Petitions, Remonstrations, Communications and Accompanying Documents. 2. Resolutions. 3. Reports of Committees, first standing and afterward special committees. 4. Miscellaneous business.
- Rule 9. Every member present shall vote unless excused by the Chairman.
- Rule 10. Every vote taken in regard to levying taxes, appropriating money, or dividing or altering the boundaries of any town. city or village shall be taken by Yeas and Nayes, and the same shall be entered on the journal.
- Rule 11. Roll Calls shall be taken by signed ballot. Ballot pads with names printed on pads will be furnished each supervisor.
- Rule 12. No petitions, resolutions or motions having for its object the division or alteration of the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be entered on or considered at the same session of the Board at which it was introduced, but the same shall lie over for consideration at the next regular adjourned or special session of the Board.

Rule 13. Each member prior to speaking shall rise and address himself to and be recognized by the Chair. If two or more members arise at the same time the chairman shall decide who shall speak first but in all other cases the member who arises and addresses the chair first shall have the preference.

Rule 14. Omitted.

- Rule 15. No report or resolution appropriating any money shall be acted upon until the next day after presentation without permission of two-thirds of the members present.
- Rule 16. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts Rules of Order shall govern in all cases where they are applicable.
- Rule 17. Any of the foregoing rules, except Rules 10 and 12 may be rescinded, changed or suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- Rule 18. Rules Nos. 10 and 12 may be rescinded, altered or suspended by a two-thirds vote of all the members entitled to seats on the County Board.
- Rule 19. The Committee on Equalization shall render their report immediately after roll call on the first day of the session but said report shall not be acted upon on the day it is presented

Rule 20. Omitted.

- Rule 21. No informal ballot cast by this Board shall be declared a formal ballot. In no case shall any official be elected by this Board by casting a unanimous vote in favor of any candidate or nominee.
- Rule 22. The Board shall meet monthly on the third Tuesday, in addition to the statutory meetings in April and November of each year. Special meetings shall be held subject to the call of the Chair.
- Rule 23. All officers elected by the County Board except those elected at the April session, shall be nominated and all nominations lay over to the following day before they are voted on.
- Rule 24. All resolutions or petitions to be presented to a session of the County Board shall be presented five days in advance of the scheduled session and a report or copy shall be mailed to each County Supervisor. An emergency situation may grant an exception provided approval is given by two-thirds of the membership.
- Rule 25. All purchases for the courthouse, courthouse annex and jail shall be channeled through the Purchasing Committee.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Committee on Claims - Audit - Printing and Property

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To audit, allow or disallow all claims filed in the office of the county clerk or referred to the committee, and shall file a schedule of such claims allowed with the county clerk for payment and shall make a report to the County Board of all claims audited.
- To meet with the State Auditors to study and examine the report on the accounts covered in their audit and make a report of the findings to the County Board.
- To approve the reports of the county clerk, county treasurer, district attorney, register of deeds and clerk of courts before such reports are presented to the County Board.
- To accept bids on the printing of the County Board proceedings, stationery, envelopes and general printing for county officers and offices and court calendars.
- To act on all matters of printing referred to them by the County Board or any department of the county.
- To supervise and have charge of the courthouse, courthouse annex, county jail and the grounds of these buildings and the Gov. Dodge home site.
 - 7. To keep in repair and good condition these properties.
- 8. In order to maintain uniformity of equipment, this committee shall purchase the equipment for all offices in the courthouse, courthouse annex and jail with the following exception—no office equipment shall be purchased for the Highway Department, except when such purchases are made from the general fund or a mutual agreement on cost savings can be reached, through volume purchases of miscellaneous supplies.
- 9. This committee shall function during the year and when the County Board is not in session.

Committee on Welfare

It Shall Be the Duty of This Board:

- 1. At the first meeting of such board, elect from their numbers, a chairman, a secretary, and such other officers as they deem necessary. Vacancies in such offices shall be filled for the unexpired terms. The chairman shall preside at all meetings when present, and shall countersign all actions taken by the board. In case of the absence of a chairman for any meeting the members present shall choose a temporary chairman.
- 2. Appoint a county director of public welfare subject to the provisions of s. 49.50 (2) to (5) and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.
- 3. Supervise the working of the county department of public welfare and shall be the policy-making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing the administration of the functions, duties and powers assigned to said department under s. 46.22 (4) and (5).
- 4. Whenever it determines that there is a need therefor, appoint committees consisting of residents of the county, which committee shall advise with the board on any matter for which they are created, but members of such committees shall serve without compensation.
- Consult with the county director of public welfare concerning the preparation of the annual budget, the annual report of the county department of public welfare and the appointment of necesary personnel.

Committee on Highway

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. The County Highway Committee shall have supervision over the maintenance and construction of all roads and bridges as provided by statutes and shall submit to the County Board an annual report including the report of the County Highway Committee of all receipts and expenditures in the County Highway Department and shall submit an annual budget and recommendations for the tax levy for road and bridge purposes to the County Board at the annual session and any other duties as outlined in the statutes or as directed by County Board action.
- The County Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the Iowa County Traffic Department.
- 3. The Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the operation of the county ambulance.

Committee on Salary and Personnel

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To set the policy of each department not in conflict with the Statutes or when called upon for this purpose, also to designate the duties and responsibilities of the different offices.
- 2. To hear and consider the grievances reported by county departments, county offficers and county employees and to make their recommendations to the County Board after sufficient consideration with the committee responsible.
- 3. To meet at least annually not later than October 15th of each year.
- 4. To recommend to the County Board the compensation of all county officers and employees.
- 5. To receive from all other committees responsible for hiring employees, all matters pertaining to clerk hire, salary, working hours and conditions and departmental problems.

Committee on Finance - Equalization - Bonds and Insurance It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To prepare and present to the County Board at the annual session the budget and tax levy; first in a temporary form, and finally in a complete form as changed during the County Board session.
- 2. To report upon all resolutions and petitions for appropriations presented to the Board.
- To report and make recommendations on the finances of the county from time to time when required.
- 4. To have supervision over and make an equalization of the assessments on all property in the county for taxes between the several towns, villages and cities of the county.
- To report in detail on the equalization report at the annual session of the board.
- To meet annually with the supervisor of assessments and county assessors at their spring meeting.
- To determine the amounts of bonds to be furnished by the county officers to the county and to report on the sufficiency of such bonds.
- 8. To designate and report to the county board the banks of lowe county that may apply as a depository for county funds.

9. To have charge of all county insurance.

Committee on Agriculture

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To perform all duties prescribed by law as further instructed by the County Board.
- 2. The general duty of the committee is to protect and enhance the financial interest of the county in all things agricultural.
- 3. This committee, working in conjunction with state and federal authorities shall according to statute, enter into, consummate and cancel contracts with all extension workers and be the authority in the matter of policy of the extension office.
- 4. This committee shall bring before the proper committee requests for appropriations for fiscal years, listing the salaries and estimated expense of each department of extension work.
- To examine and approve all claims filed against Iowa county by the Extension Department.
- 6. The committee has in the past requested the assistance of agricultural leaders of the county in the formation of an agricultural program for the year. This privilege is to continue.
- 7. As the county is a soil conservation district, the committee automatically serves as supervisor of said district and must sign all contracts with those who enter into soil conservation contracts.
- To act in an advisory capacity on all agricltural appropriations unless otherwise instructed by the County Board.

Committee on Health - Education and Institutions

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To examine the accounts of the Hospital and Home.
- To act as an advisory committee with the Board of Trustees in the maintenance, repairs and construction of buildings.
- To report to the County Board but in no way interfere with the management of the Hospitai and Home by the Board of Trustees as established by law.
- To act in an advisory capacity with the county nurse on all types of health programs and may audit the personnel expenses.
- Annually plan and recommend the budget for the health program.
- To act as a liaison committee for Iowa County regarding the participation in the Southwestern Wisconsin Library Processing Center.

Committee on Tax Claims - Addressograph and Veterans Office It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To consider, examine and report to the County Board, its findings in all matters of illegal assessments, tax titles and delinquent lands that may come before the board for action.
- 2. To supervise all delinquent taxes returned to the county, supervise the taking of tax deeds, supervise the sale of real estate taken on tax deed to the end that the property is returned to the tax roll and aid in the collection of delinquent taxes. Where the value of the property involved warrants it, the committee shall have the power to appraise the property and in its discretion insure it for the benefit of the county.
- 3. To make appraisals pursuant to Chapter 75.69 of the county owned tax deed lands.

- To sell and dispose to the best interest of the county those lands to which the county has taken tax deeds.
- To employ the services of the county surveyor to establish the location of county owned property when necessary.
- To authorize and recommend the county treasurer at their discretion to assign to heirs, mortgagees or adjacent property owners, tax certificates purchased by the county at the annual sale of tax certificates.
- To advise with and assist the service officer regarding his duties in compliance with Wisconsin Stautes.
 - 8. To meet as necessary.
- To have charge of and supervise the operation and use of the addressograph system.

Committee on Courts - Justice and Law Enforcement

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee;

- The committee may examine all accounts and claims filed against the county by the sheriff and his deputies, and may make a report to the County Board at any meeting thereof.
- 2. To have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the county police radio system, and shall act upon such other matters as may be referred to it by the County Board.
- To consider the reports and information made available by the courts for presentation to the county board.

Committee on Civil Defense

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. This committee under the direction of the County Board chairman shall to the extent of its ability carry out the duties of the Civil Defense program as covered by Wisconsin Statutes.

Committee on Rural Planning

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

1. To function as governed by Wisconsin Statutes.

Committee on Resource Development

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To give assistance in an advisory capacity in so far as is possible for all resource development in Iowa County.
- To have charge of and advise with the County Board on all matters regarding airports.
- 3. To audit the accounts of any money appropriated by the County Board for conservation work.
- To supervise the purchase of equipment and supplies used in association with the duties of this committee where the funds were appropriated by the County Board.
- 5. To have charge of and advise the Iowa County Board of all matters relative to conservation of the natural resources of the county and to cooperate with all county, state and federal organizaions in the development of the same.
- 6. To receive all petitions referred to it by the County Board, by the Highway Committee and any citizen group relating to the construction, relocation, maintenance and repairs of any federal, state or county road in the county and report their recommendations to the next session of the County Board.
 - To confer with the Highway Committee on all allocations and grants of federal and state funds and on any other highway atters of major importance.

The Board proceeded to the election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman for a term of two years.

As a result of the election Sup. Richard Scullion was elected Chairman for a term of two years and Sup. Russell Stenseth was declared elected Vice-Chairman for a term of two years,

The next order of business was the election of three members to the Department of Social Services Board for a term of one year.

As a result of the election Sup. Demuth, Miller and Pustina were elected for a term of one year.

The next order of business was the election of a Highway Committee for a term of one year.

As a result of the election Sup. Branger, Ryan and Pailing were elected members of the Highway Committee.

The matter of appointment of Committees was brought before the Board by the Chairman. Due to the illness of the Vice-Chairman it was the decision of the Board to elect two members to the Committee on Committees to serve with the Chairman to appoint Committees.

The Board proceeded to the election of two members to serve on the Committee on Committees.

As a result of the election Sup. Branger and Miller were elected to serve as members of the Committee.

Mr. Ken Palzkill addressed the Board stating Bill Ryall and Doug Schmoekel have served twenty-five years as dedicated members of the Iowa County Ambulance crew.

Chairman Scullion, on behalf of the Iowa County Board of Supervisors, presented Bill Ryall and Doug Schmoekel with Certificates of Appreciation for their twenty-five years of service to the Iowa County Ambulance Crew. He stated they deserve recognition for their charitable and worthwhile efforts.

Bill Ryall and Doug Schmoekel thanked the Board for the Certificates of Recognition presented by the Board.

Communication (No. 2) from the Office of the Commissioner

of Insurance regarding the appraisal of Iowa County property was read.

The communication was referred to the Committee on Finance and Insurance for their recommendation.

Report (No. 3) of the Highway Committee regarding paramedic training and county participation was read.

Iowa County Board of Supervisors:

Lady and Gentlemen:

Mr. John Matthias is a resident of Dodgeville and an attendant on the Iowa County Ambulance. It is now necessary that all personnel must be trained and qualified to serve as attendants. Mr. Matthias has been chosen from many applicants to receive paramedic training for a period of twelve weeks. He would like to be paid by the County at the rate of \$150.00 per week retroactive to March 11, 1974. The Committee recommends the payment of this amount. A paramedic would have the knowledge and ability to provide all the services of a medical doctor in times of emergency. Mr. Matthias would agree to help train other ambulance attendants in the County.

The Committee also believes this would be in keeping with the County's policy of continuing the finest, most efficient am-

bulance services for Iowa County.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 51.08(6) Wisconsin Statutes, the Bureau of Municipal Audit, State Department of Revenue, has audited the financial records of the Iowa County Hospital for the period July 1, 1972 to June 30, 1973. Their audit report was submitted to the Iowa County Board of Supervisors under date of February 13, 1974.

On Pages 11, 12, and 13 the audit report discusses the subject "Accounts Receivable - Care of Hospital Patients due from State and other counties," The last sentence of the discussion on page 13 reads: "The difference of \$23,780.67 is due the state."

This amount consists of monies included in the payment to Iowa County from State appropriation 20.435(2)(d) Wisconsin Statutes and monies paid by counties to the State, based on 1974 State Special Charges, and subsequently forwarded by the State to Iowa County as provided in Section 74.26(1) Wisconsin Statutes.

The following schedule determines the distribution of \$23,-780.67 to the factors referred to in the previous paragraph:

Section 51.08(6) provides that any resulting adjustments (from audits) to settlements already made under Section 46.106 shall be carried into the next such settlement.

The next settlement to counties of state funds from the State appropriation Section 20.435(2)(d) will be in April 1974 pursuant to Section 540P, as created by Chapter 90, Laws of 1973. Such settlement will include audit adjustments applicable to care provided during the 1972/73 fiscal year in county mental hospitals other than the Iowa County Hospital.

To be consistent with the date of settlement of audit adjustments for other county mental hospitals we ask that Iowa County issue a check in the amount of \$9,707.54 payable to the State Department of Health and Social Services and mail the same to the Bureau of Collections, 1 West Wilson Street, Madison, WI 53702, to arrive on or about May 1, 1974.

The amount of \$14,073.13 will be included in the "State Special Charges" to Iowa County, to be certified by the State Department of Administration in October, 1974, as provided in Section 70.60 Wisconsin Statutes. The related credits to counties

of legal settlement will also be included in such certification of "State Special Charges."

RESOLUTION FOR THE CREATION OF A COUNTY COMMISSION ON AGING AS RELATED TO AREA AGENCIES ON AGING

WHEREAS, The older people of Iowa County are now and have long been contributing members to this county's social and economic well being. In order that these members are able to be a vital part and in order to meet their unique needs, increased planning and services must be provided. With the attention now being given by the national and state governments and in our own community toward senior citizens, it is important that the county also contribute in an effective manner toward making a positive impact on the lives of its older citizens.

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the following Resolution be hereby adopted:

1. Iowa County Commission on Aging Created

There is hereby created an Iowa County Commission on Aging.

2. Purpose

The Commission shall act to improve the quality of life for the senior citizens of Iowa County.

3. Appointing Authority

The members of the Commission shall be appointed by the chairman of the County Board, subject to confirmation by the County Board.

4. Membership of Commission

- a. The Commission shall consist of at least 9, but no more than 13. At least 51 percent of the members shall be senior citizens 60 years of age or over, and at least one member shall be under the age of 35. No more than two members shall be elected county officials,
- b. Tenures: The members shall serve for a term of three years with the exception of the original first membership whose terms shall be staggered $\frac{1}{3}$ 3 years, $\frac{1}{3}$ 2 years, $\frac{1}{3}$ 1 year.

That said members shall serve without compensation or per diem.

c. Organization, By-Laws: The commission shall at its first meeting proceed to elect a chairperson, a vice-chairperson. and a secretary. Officers so elected shall serve for a term of one year. The Commission shall be authorized to adopt its own by-laws and procedures providing they are not inconsistent with the by-laws of the Area Agency on Aging.

d. Representation on Area Agency on Aging

The Commission shall elect a member to the Board of Directors to the Area Agency on Aging in the Planning and Service Area.

e. Responsibility of Delegate to Area Agency on Aging

The County Commission on Aging shall recommend to its member of the board of the Area Agency on Aging its selection or priorities as listed in the State Operating Plan under Title III.

5. Duties, Powers

The powers and duties of the Commission, which sha'l be exercised and performed in conformity with the laws and ordinances of the County of Iowa, shall be as follows:

- a. The commission shall act as the clearinghouse for all county (public and private) programs on aging and the Area Agency on Aging.
- b. The commission shall provide current information on the ages, income, population, and demographic characteristics of the elderly in the County to the Area Agency on Aging.
- c. The Commission shall delineate areas that need services and utilize existing community programs through community cooperation and coordination that will provide an efficient method for delivery of services.

- f. The Commission shall act as the mechanism through which the voices of the older person can be heard on any and all issues relating to the well-being and enhancing the function of the elderly as contributing members to the community.
- g. The Commission shall be authorized to establish sub-committees to encourage the development of community involvement, but in keeping with the purposes and objectives of the Commission.
- h. The Commission shall in cooperation with the Area Agency on Aging encourage the development of new and expanded programs for older adults consistent with the delineated areas of need.
- The Commission shall cooperate with the Area Agency on Aging and related public and private agencies and the clder citizens in planning efforts.
- j. The Commission shall make an annual report of its activities to the County Board of Supervisors and shall make such other reports as the County Board from time to time requires.
- k The Commission shall prepare annually a budget for necessary and reasonable expenditures to be incurred by the Com-

mission in accomplishing its goals and mandates subject to review and approval of the County Board.

6. Administrative Assistance

The County Board of Supervisors shall provide for the needs of the Commission including office space.

7. Relationship

All departments and divisions of county government shall assist the Commission in fulfilling its purpose.

You have asked my opinion as to whether or not it continues to be necessary to have a Board of Trustees to manage the Iowa County Home now that Iowa County Hospital has been closed.

It is my opinion that there is a continuing requirement that the Board of Trustees manage the County Home. The closing of the Hospital has no effect on the requirement that a Board of Trustees manage the County Home,

Section 46.18(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes requires that every County Home . . . shall be managed by a Board of Trustees, electors of the county, chosen by ballot by the County Board."

Mr. Dregne addressed the Board and explained the steps necessary to declare portions of Iowa County as a disaster area.

Sup. Ryan moved to go on record recommending Iowa County be designated as an Emergency Loan Area and a letter be

directed to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin requesting such designation.

Sup. Miller seconded the motion. Carried,

Sup. Eichorst addressed the Board and stated that for some time it has been the opinion of some of the members of the Board that Iowa County have a Home Health Care Service.

At a recent meeting of the Health Committee action was taken by the Committee to present a resolution to this meeting of the Board. At the present time no resolution is available for presentation.

The Medical Society has indicated they would be in favor of implementing a Home Health Care Service in the County and it be reviewed on a three to six months basis.

In order for the County to be eligible to receive a grant from the State a Resolution must be presented not later than August 1, 1974. Therefore, a Resolution or motion must be made from the County Board floor indicating the desire of the County to participate in the program.

Chairman Scullion stated Miss Fran Pagenkoph, Mrs. Jeanne Patenaude and Mrs. Debbie Nelson were present and asked for any further information that they might be able to provide the Board.

Mrs. Jeanne Patenaude addressed the Board and stated that the Home Care Program involves making the agency an accredited agency in order to provide additional services. She also stated that all other counties in this area have Home Care Agencies, The application for the grant will request budget information in terms of what the grant money will be used for. The County must appropriate a specific amount to begin the program, to pay for supplies, etc. The first priority for a Home Care Grant is starting a new agency and the request should be in the Madison office by August 1, 1974. This past year Lafayette County initiated the program and they are very positive toward it.

To qualify for the grant Iowa County would be required to provide at least two services to be considered a certified agency. One of the two services is a Registered Nurse, already provided under our Health Program and the other should be an aide, Physical Therapist, Social Service Worker, Occupational Therapist, or Speech and Hearing Therapist.

Mrs. Patenaude also brought to the attention of the Board that it is necessary that the County Supervisors understand that the nurses and qualified personnel employed in the office be under a Merit System Standards with established personnel policies determined by Iowa County.

Sup. Eichorst moved that a Resolution be presented before the Board stating Iowa County will participate in the Home Care Program.

Sup. Hogan seconded the motion. Carried.

Sup. Miller addressed the Board regarding the appraisal of properties of Iowa County,

Communication (No. 4) from the Village of Blanchardville

acknowledging receipt of \$500.00 from Iowa County in support of their ambulance service was read.

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Communication (No. 5) from the Wisconsin Department of Administration advising the County Clerk that the lease dated June 1, 1971 by and between Iowa County as lessor and the State of Wisconsin, Department of Administration as lessee is being cancelled as of September 30, 1974 was read.

Sup. Laufenberg moved to accept the communication.

Sup. Pustina seconded the motion. Carried.

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Sup. Eichorst, Memorial Hospital Board President presented a check in the amount of \$23,901.80 on behalf of Mr. William Greene, Memorial Hospital Administrator, as a loan payment for the first six months of operation of the Memorial Hospital and Care Center.

Chairman Scullion thanked Mr. Greene for the loan payment.

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Chairman Scullion advised the Board that Sup. Eichorst, Greene and Bishop had been appointed as members of a study committee to study the issue before the Board regarding zoning for the blacktop plant at the area known as the Kurth quarry.

Sup. Bishop addressed the Board and presented Report (No. 6 of the committee recommending a compromise regarding the site of the blacktop plant.

REPORT OF THE STUDY COMMITTEE ON BLACKTOP PLANT

We the members of the Study Committee appointed to consider the issue before the County Board regarding the zoning for the blacktop plant herein submit the report of our findings.

We reviewed the information on file including the hearings and proceedings to date, met with the Highway Committee, Mr. Kurth and their attorney, met with the objecting property owners and their attorney, and finally met with both groups with the District Attorney, the press, interested citizens, a representative of the zoning committee and the zoning administrator in attendance.

In the consideration which we have given to the issue we have tried to assess with fairness the objection which has been filed, the intention of the zoning ordinance and the continuing need for blacktop. With these issues in mind we have negotiated the following compromise which we believe is acceptable by all parties even though less satisfactory than would have been desired by either side of the issue.

This compromise will give the County an opportunity to find a new site for the blacktop plant operation and as a concession for the time allowed for the continued operation of the blacktop plant the County will terminate all involvement with the quarry at the end of the time period stipulated.

It is agreed that if this compromise is ratified by the County Board the matter of the land use change will remain tabled and that the objecting land owners will not attempt to enjoin the operation during the time period stipulated.

Therefore our recommendations are:

- 1 The blacktop plant operation is to cease at the area known as the Kurth Quarry on December 31, 1976.
- 2 The quarry operation by the County is to cease at the Kurth Quarry on December 31, 1976.
 - 3 The County will agree to discontinue the purchase of rock

or gravel from the quarry currently existing in the NW4 of Section 31, Town 6 North. Range 3 East after December 31, 1976.

This has been a difficult assignment and we have attempted to give complete consideration to all aspects of the matter before us. Our recommendation may not be without fault but it is the result of a sincere effort to negotiate a compromise, the only apparently reasonable solution to the situation.

Attorney Roger Mueller, representing the property owners in the area of the Kurth quarry also addressed the Board stating property owners object to the speed of trucks in the area, dust and the blasting charges.

Other interested citizens also addressed the Board favoring and objecting to the location of the hot mix plant.

Chairman Scullion requested a roll call vote be taken on the recommendations of the study committee as presented to the Board.

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Chairman Scullion thanked Mr. Pat Reilly of the Dodgeville

Chronicle for the Open Meetings Law Phamplet, Chapter 297, Laws 1973 provided each member of the Board.

Sup. Eishop addressed the Board concerning the Iowa County 51.42 Board set up last year to deal with the new 51.42 Comprehensive Mental Health, Mental Retardation, Alcoholism, Drug Abuse legislation. The Board worked in agreement with the 51.42 Boards of Grant and Crawford counties to continue the operations. Now the Board feels they should go back to one multicounty 51.42 Board, one committee representing two counties to cut down on the number of committees and still adequately supervise the various programs.

Sup. Bishop also explained the funding by the state of 100% for basic needs but advised that \$55,000.00 would be requested as an appropriation by Iowa County in the event the 100% state funding is not provided.

Ordinance (No. 14, September 17, 1974) was read.

IOWA COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 14, SEPT. 17, 1974 COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH, MENTAL RETARDATION ALCOHOLISM AND DRUG ABUSE SERVICES

An ordinance to repeal Iowa County ordinance Chapters No. 22, Nov. 14, 1973 and No. 6, Dec. 11, 1973 and to recreate Ordinance Chapter No. 14, Sept. 17, 1974 of the Iowa County Ordinances. The Iowa County Board of Supervisors do ordain as follows:

SECTION I. Establishment. Pursuant to Section 51.42 Wisconsin Statutes, there is established a community mental health mental retardation, alcoholism and drug abuse board for Iowa County, in combination with Grant County.

SECTION II. Name. The name of such joint Board shall be "Unified Board of Grant and Iowa Counties."

SECTION III. Purposes. The program hereby created shall identify, develop, provide, or cause to be provided such services as are necessary to the prevention or amelioration of mental disabilities, including but not limited to mental illness, mental retardation, alcoholism and drug abuse. It shall facilitate the use of community resources to the fullest extent through unit of management, control and fiscal responsibility.

SECTION IV. Board of Directors. There shall be appointed a governing and policy-making board of directors composed of 11 members. Such board shall have charge of the operation and administration of the program.

- (1) Members of the board shall be appointed by the Chairmen of the County Boards of Supervisors. Appointments shall be subject to confirmation by each respective Board of Supervisors. Not more than 3 members shall be members of County Board of Supervisors of any combining county. There shall be representation of the interests of the mentally ill, the mentally retarded, the alcoholic and drug abusers, by persons of recognized ability and demonstrated interest in these conditions.
- (2) Seven representatives will be appointed from Grant County and four from Iowa County by the respective County Board Chairmen.
- (3) The term of office of each member of the board of directors from the two counties, appointed pursuant to this ordinance, shall be for three years except that in the members first appointed by Grant County, two shall be appointed for a term of one year, two for a term of two years, and three for a term of three years; and of the members appointed by Iowa County, one shall be for a term of one year, one shall be for a term of two years, and two for a term of three years. Vacancies for unexpired terms shall be filled in the same manner as original appointments.

Any director appointed hereunder, may be removed by the appointing authority in accordance with the procedure and authority set forth in the statutes.

- (4) Directors appointed hereunder, shall be compensated for their services and travel expenses at a rate subject to approval of the County Boards.
- (5) Subject to the provisions of Sections 51.42. Wisconsin Statutes and any amendments thereof, and Rule PW-MH 60.20, Wisconsin Administrative Code, the board of directors shall have the powers and duties set forth therein and shall specifically:
- (a) assume the responisibility of the Board of Directors of the Southwest Wisconsin Mental Health Center;
- (b) own and operate the Grant County Personal Development Center;
 - (c) be authorized to receive and disburse funds;
- (d) negotiate and execute such contracts for the provision or securing of resources as may be necessary to the development or maintenance of services;
- (e) the County Boards of Supervisors of Grant and Iowa Counties pursuant to Section 51.437 (4)(b), Wisconsin Statutes, recreated in Chapter 90, Laws of 1973, do ordain that the Community Mental Health, Mental Retardation, Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Board established under Section 51.42, Wisconsin Statutes, is hereby designated as the Developmental Disabilities Board with all the powers, duties and responsibilities specified under Section 51.437. Wisconsin Statutes.

SECTION V. Finances.

- (1) The program shall be financed by such funds as may be available through public and private sources; and the board is authorized to accept private donations and to request and receive state and federal grants-in-aid in addition to county funds.
- (2) The Board of Directors shall plan its financial operations on a calendar year basis; and each year it shall submit its proposed budget for the next calendar year to the County Board of Supervisors prior to October.
- (3) The expenses incurred in the operation of the program shall be paid by the ss51.42 Program and charged against appropriations and other funds credited to the Program. Said Program shall receive, deposit and credit to the separate account of said Program all funds paid over for the said Program's operations by any source.

SECTION VI. Reports. The Board of Directors shall make an annual report to the County Boards of Supervisors, and it shall make or cause to be made such reports as may be required by pertinent statutes.

SECTION VII. Contract. The existence or establishment of a program in combination with any other county or counties shall necessitate the execution of a written contractural agreement binding each county to perform its several and mutual obligations as set forth in this ordinance.

SECTION VIII. Repealer. Any ordinance or resolution previously enacted and relating to any predecessor agency or program, or which conflicts with this ordinance is hereby repealed.

SECTION IX. Severability of Ordinance Provisions. Should any section, clause, or provision of this ordinance be declared to be invalid the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof.

SECTION X. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect upon passage, approval and publication as required by law, by

the County Boards of Grant and Iowa, with an implementation date of January 1, 1975.

WHEREAS, said statute requires the execution of a contract between the counties involved, defining the program and plans for operation of the Unified Board, all to the end that community resources can be utilized to the fullest extent through unity of management, control and fiscal responsibility;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County of Grant, and the County of Iowa do hereby covenant and agree that the program and plans for operation of the unified Board shall be as outlined and set forth in Ordinances as adopted, in the plans and budgets of the previous Unified Boards of Grant and Iowa Counties.

Either party wishing to terminate this agreement may do so by notifying the other parties of its determination to dissolve this agreement at least ninety days prior to the anniversary date of the agreement.

Upon completion of the audit of the first six months of operation of our facility in 1974, we find that it would be economically unfeasible for MA rates to be lowered to the present private pay rates. After consulting Mr. John Murphy of the State Department of Health and Social Services, he informs us that according to law, Medical Assistance rates are not to exceed private pay rates.

At the present time our private pay rates are \$14.10 and \$16.10 per day based on the level of care the resident requires. The present MA rates are \$15.16 or \$17.82 per day.

I would also like to request the County Board's approval that should MA rates increase in the future, the Board of Trustees of the Iowa County Home be given the authority to increase private pay rates accordingly.

I would appreciate a decision relative to the aforementioned as soon as possible.

- That public convenience and necessity, present and future of the County of Iowa and inhabitants thereof requires the continuation of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway line sought to be abandoned in the action before the Interstate Commerce Commission identified as Docket No. AB-1 (Sub No. 41).
- That the County of Iowa shall oppose such application and the appearance to do so and to protest and oppose is hereby authorized.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State Highway Commission be and is hereby petitioned, upon the filing of a request therefore by the County Highway Committee of this county, which said Committee is hereby authorized to file, to transfer to or between any such previously authorized or additionally needed construction improvements in this county, any funds allotted by the State under the provisions of Section 84.03(3), Wisconsin Statutes, and previously allocated to any other improvement or remaining unallocated in reserve.

Resolution (No. 5) authorizing the Iowa County Highway Committee to purchase highway equipment without further authority provided no one complete unit of equipment exceeds \$250,-000.00 was read and laid over under the rules.

PURCHASE OF HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT - IOWA COUNTY

WHEREAS for the construction and maintenance of highways, including the removal and control of snow and ice, it becomes necessary from time to time to purchase equipment, the nature of and necessity for which cannot be accurately anticipated.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Committee is hereby authorized, pursuant to Section 83.015(2) of the Statutes, to purchase without further authority, and to the extent that revolving funds accumulated for such purpose or appropriations made for such purpose are available, such highway equipment as they deem necessary to properly carry on the work, and to trade or sell such old equipment as may be considered to be for the best interests of the county;

PROVIDED that no one complete unit of equipment of a value exceeding Two Hundred Fifty Thousand and no/dollars (\$250,000.00) shall be purchased without further authority of the County Board.

RESOLUTION NO. 6 COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1975

SECTION I. The County Board of Supervisors of Iowa County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work in the year 1975 under the provisions of Section 20.395 and Chapter 83 of the Statutes, and the additional sums herein appropriated, shall be expended as hereinafter set forth:

SECTION II. COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY ALLOTMENT. WHEREAS the Division of Highways has notified the County Clerk that a sum of money estimated to be \$286,300.00 will become available at the end of the fiscal year under the provisions of Sections 83.10 and 20.395 (1)(qa) & (qb) of the Statutes, for the county trunk highway system in the county, but the actual amount will not be known until the close of the fiscal year ending next June 30.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Committee is authorized and directed to expend the said sum to the extent required to match and supplement Federal aid for construction, right of way, and other costs on any Federal projects located on the county trunk highway system of said county, which are not recovered from Federal funds, and to expend any balance for constructing, repairing, and maintaining such county trunk highway system and the bridges thereon, including snow and ice removal and control, as directed in Section 83.10(1) of the Statutes, and to reimburse the general fund for any expenditures that may be made therefrom pursuant to Section 83.01(6) of the Statutes. The distribution to such purposes is estimated, but not specifically directed, to be as follows:

SECTION IV. WHEREAS it appears that certain additional

highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board does hereby appriate the following sums for the purpose hereinafter set forth:

(1) For the maintenance of the County Trunk Highway

System the sum of \$1,000,000.00.

- (2) For emergency road or bridge repairs or construction, the necessity for which is determined by the County Highway Committee and for which other funds are not available, the sum of \$100,000.00.
- (3) For the purchase of machinery and for machinery repairs the sum of \$250,000.00.

(4) For the purchase of county gravel pits and stone quar-

ries the sum of sale from materials.

(5) For admin stration, including salaries, per diem, officer and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of \$40,000.00

Total authorized in this Section \$1,390,000.00.

SECTION V. WHEREAS appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts to be received from the state and available for work in the county under Section 20.395 of the Statutes.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the county to meet such appropriations as follows:

 For the various purposes as set forth in Section IV hereof the sum of \$1,390,000.00.

WARNING: It is directed that provisions for this levy shall be made in the county budget, but that this levy shall not be duplicated.

SECTION VII. WHEREAS the various highway activities for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work cannot be known at the time of making the appropriation therefore.

BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropr tion for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed may be used by the County Highway Committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement, which is part of the the same item in the county budget, for which provision is herein made, and any balance remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year.

SECTION VIII. WHEREAS the exact amount of the funds that will become available from the state for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.395 of the Statutes will not be known until on or after next June 30.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments for the purposes for which such funds are to be used, as hereinbefore authorized, from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purposes for which appropriated prior to next August 1 and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the sums received under Section 20.395 of the Statutes.

SECTION IX. WHEREAS the County Highway Committee and the County Highway Commissioner are charged with the duty and responsibility of carrying out the construction and maintenance of highways for which provision is made, and other related supervisory and administrative duties.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Commissioner shall have authority to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate

such personnel as he deems necessary for such purposes, provided however that the County Highway Committee may by action recorded in its minutes determine the number of persons to be hired and may also at any time by action so recorded order the County Highway Commissioner to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate any such person. The term "personnel" or "person" shall include all patrolmen, laborers, foremen, clerks, stenographers, or other employees necessary to carry on such activities.

Report (No. 8) of the Highway Committee on Highway Programming to be undertaken in 1975 was read.

REPORT NO. 8 OF THE HIGHWAY COMMITTEE ON HIGHWAY PROGRAMMING TO BE UNDERTAKEN IN 1975

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Iowa County; Lady and Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Highways proposes to improve the following County roads in 1975 as to the needs for improvement by relocation, grading and gravel base, ditching or bituminous surfacing for the following County Highways.

- C.T.H. "J" Jct. C.T.H. "X" and C.T.H. "E", 3.74 miles.
 Some relocation, grade and base, fencing and right of way where needed. Estimated cost \$224,400.00.
 - C.T.H. "II" Jet. C.T.H. "Q" to C.T.H. "I", 3,35 miles. Some relocation, grade and base, fencing and right of way. Estimated cost, \$201,000.00.
- C.T.H. "NN" Jct. S.T.H. "130" to Knight Road, 2 miles, grade and base, fencing and right of way (if can be acquired), estimated cost \$120,000.00.
- C.T.H. "B" Jct. S.T.H. "39" east to new grade, grade and base, 1.5 miles. Estimated cost \$40,000.00.
 - C.T.H. "DD" Jct "U" and "K", 2.68 miles, grade and base, right of way and fencing. Estimated cost, \$160,800.00.
 - C.T.H. "Y" Jct. C.T.H. "H" and C.T.H. "ZZ", 2.00 miles, grade and base, right of way and fencing. Estimated cost \$120,000.00.

The above plans may vary considerably due to the difficulty in acquiring right of way and the increased cost of fencing materials.

- C.T.H. "A" Jct. C.T.H. "F" and Dane County Line, 3.20 miles, bituminous surface. Estimated cost \$57,600.00.
- C.T.H. "W" Jct. S.T.H. "39" to Lafayette County, 4.5 miles, bituminous overlay (hot mix). Estimated cost, \$81,000.00.
- C.T.H. "H" Jct. U.S.H. "18-151" to U.S.H. "14", 12 miles, bituminous overlay. Estimated cost, \$216,000.00.
- C.T.H. "H" Jct. "K" and "F", 1.7 miles, bituminous overlay. Estimated cost, \$30,600,00.

The Commissioner and Committee plan on an extensive program of seal coating to protect and conserve the bituminous surfaces wherever needed.

This is a very extensive program and probably more than can be accomplished in one year. We know we cannot accomplish all this work by our own forces even if we have all the necessary financing.

We wish to thank the County Board for all the courtesies and consideration extended to us. We also appreciated the fine services, especially in winter, from all our personnel to maintain our record of services in keeping our roads serviceable by prompt removal of snow and ice control.

We also thank the commissioner, patrol superintendent, clerical help and all the personnel from Division No. 1, Department of Transportation, Division of Highways for all the help rendered to us in providing the necessary assistance.

The bridge construction and repairs as programmed for 1975 are as follows:

- The Maughn Bridge on C.T.H. "Q", the Union Mills road, replacement. Estimated cost \$35,000.00.
- The Wasley Bridge on C.T.H. "NN", replacement by bridge or twin culverts. Estimated cost \$30,000.00.
- The Cullen Bridge on C.T.H. "Y", replacement. Estimated cost, \$30,000.00.
- The Cutler Bridge on C.T.H. "Y", replacement by 94"x58"x66' long pipe arch. Estimated cost, \$6,000.00.

Communication (No. 7) from John Brennan, Iowa County Home Administrator regarding the rate freeze imposed by Governor Lucey for Medical Assistance patients in all Nursing Homes was read.

January 9, 1975

Dear Mr. Scullion and Honorable Board of Supervisors:

As Administrator of the Iowa County Nursing Home, I would like to bring your attention to the rate freeze imposed by Governor Lucey regarding the Medical Assistance patients in all Nursing Homes within the State. I am suggesting that the County Board notify Governor Lucey's office as to the severe effect this rate freeze will be on the economic operation of our County Home in 1975.

I am sure you are aware that our budget was planned and approved with data of rates proposed by the Division of Family Services, Department of Health and Social Services. Considering the rate freeze imposed upon us by the Governor's office, this will incur a deficit of approximately \$100,000 for the year of 1975.

This freeze contrasts with the high priority Government gives such activities as manufacturers' tax exemptions, utility company rate increases, and other activities not involving direct services to people who suffer some of the greatest needs in our society.

The January 1, 1975 rates for which the State has already contracted with providers are necessary to meet wage increases and other inflationary costs. Some of these increases, moreover, have resulted from higher regulatory demands made by Federal and State codes for acute and long-term care.

If the Governor does not immediately rescind the freeze in question, in order to avoid the incurring of intolerable operating deficits to the providers of care, he must then be prepared to:

- Freeze the minimum wage laws which became effective on January 1, 1975.
- Freeze the proliferation of agencies involved in governing health facilities and the controversies existing be-

tween them, e.g., the current struggle between the Department of Health and Social Services and the Department of Industry, Labor and Human relations over physical plant requirements.

As County Homes suffer operating losses as a result of the freeze, an additional tax burden is placed upon the local tax-payer, contrary to the current administration's enunciated policy.

A continued freeze on Medicaid rates, moreover, will create operating losses for providers which, in many cases, will have to be met by self-paying patients and residents. This forced subsidy levied on the self-paying patients to support the Medicaid patient is not only unethical but a subterfuge on the part of the State, which pretends to bear the full cost of caring for Medicaid patients.

In summary, the people of the State of Wisconsin cannot get the care they believe they have been promised, the facility becomes the scapegoat for not delivering expected benefits, and thus general disenchantment with the integrity of government

continues.

Thus, I am requesting your immediate support in contacting the Governor's office to immediately remove the rate freeze which has been imposed by his direct on December 23, 1974.

AGREEMENT

This agreement made and entered into this 1st day of January, 1975, by and between Iowa County, Wisconsin hereinafter referred to as the Employer, and Iowa County Employees, Local 1266, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, hereinafter referred to as the Union.

ARTICLE I

1.01 The mutual interest of the Employer and the employees is recognized by this agreement for the operation of the various departments under methods that will promote safety to the employee, economy of operations, cleanliness and proper care of equipment and the protection of property, the facilities of a fair and peaceful adjustment of differences that may arise from time to time, the promulgating of rules and regulations and ethical conduct of business and relations between the Employer and the employees and to this end have reached this agreement.

ARTICLE II - Recognition

2.01 The Employer recognizes the Union as the exclusive collective bargaining representative for all the employees of the Iowa County Highway Department, except the Commissioner and Patrol Superintendent on all questions of wages, hours, and conditions of employment.

ARTICLE III - Management Rights

3.01 The Employer shall have the right to post reasonable rules to represent minimum requirements of employees while on the job. Where situations arise which are not specifically covered by the rules, the carnest cooperation of the employee with his supervisor and Employer and other employees will be expected. Any grievance arising between the Employer and the Union over said rules shall be handled as set forth herein in Article VI - Grievance Procedure.

ARTICLE IV - Probationary Period

- 4.01 All newly hired employees shall serve a ninety (90) day probationary period. During such probationary period, they shall not attain any seniority rights and shall be subject to dismissal for any reason without recourse to the grievance procedure. Seasonal employees who, upon initial hire, work less than ninety (90) days before being laid off shall be entitled to credit for such probationary time if recalled to work the following seasons.
- 4.02 Upon completion of the minety (90) day probationary period, the employee shall be granted seniority rights from the date of original hire, and his hourly rates shall advance to the rate shown in Appendix A for his classification. A seniority roster shall be posted on all shop bulletin boards and brought up to date every six months by the Employer.

ARTICLE V - Seniority Rights

- 5.01 It shall be the policy of the Employer to recognize seniority in filling vacancies, making promotions and in laying off or rehiring, provided, however, that the application of seniority shall not materially affect the efficient operation of the Iowa County Highway Department.
- 5.02 Seniority shall be based upon the actual length of continuous service for which payment has been received by the employee.
- 5.03 There shall be two seniority groups, full-time employees and seasonal employees. Seasonal employees' seniority group shall be below that of the full-time employees and all seasonal employees shall be laid off prior to any reduction in the full-time employee working force,
- 5.04 When laying off seasonal employees, the oldest in point of service shall be retained if qualified to perform the available work. When laying off full-time employees, the oldest in point of service shall be retained if the remaining personnel are qualified to perform the available work. The rehiring of employees

that have been laid off shall be in inverse order to that of laying off.

- 5.05 Whenever a vacancy occurs or a new job is created, it shall be posted on all shop bulletin boards for a period of five (5) working days. Each employee interested in applying for the job shall endorse his name upon such notice in the space provided. The full time-employee with the greatest seniority who can qualify for the job, shall be given the job. If no full-time employee bidding can qualify for the job, it shall be given to the seasonal employee with the greatest seniority who can qualify. The Employer shall have the right to temporarily fill a job that is posted. However, such temporary filling of the job shall continue only for a reasonable time after the end of the five (5) days posting or the settlement of a grievance if one should arise,
- 5.06 The initial determination as to an employee's qualifications shall be made by the Employer. However, if there is any difference of opinion as to the qualifications of an employee, the Union Committee, and/or Union representative may take the matter up for adjustment under Article VI. Grievance Procedure.
- 5.07 An employee who quits, or is laid off for a period of twenty-four months, or fails to report for work within fifteen days from postmark on notice of recall, or is discharged, except those reinstated under Article VI, Grievance Procedure, shall lose all prior seniority rights.

ARTICLE VI - Grievance Procedure

- 6.01 Any difference or misunderstanding which may arise between the Employer and an employee or between the Employer and the Union shall be handled as follows:
- 6.02 Step 1. The Union Committee, and/or Union Representative shall present the grievance to the Highway Commissioner.
- 6.03 Step 2. If a satisfactory settlement is not reached as outlined in Step 1 within one week, the Union Committee, and/or Union Representative may present the grievance to the Iowa County Highway Committee. Such a meeting shall be held within one week of receipt of written request by the other party unless a later date is set by mutual agreement.
- 6.04 Step 3. If a satisfactory settlement is not reached as outlined in Step 2 within two weeks, either party to this agreement may request mediation or fact finding services of the Wisconsin Employment Relations Commission.
- 6.05 Step 4. The results of such mediation or fact finding shall be made known to all parties concerned who shall endeavor to settle the dispute on basis thereof.
- 6.06 If a discharged employee claims injustice in his discharge, the request for a meeting on the grievance shall be made within five (5) working days. Request shall be made by letter, postmark on letter to be considered time of request. Such grievance shall be handled under the procedures outlined in the above steps.

ARTICLE VII - Leaves of Absence

7.01 Written leave of absence, without pay, for periods not in excess of six (6) months in any year, may, in the discretion of the Employer be granted to any full-time employee. Failure to grant leave of absence shall not be grounds for a grievance. The employee to whom written leave of absence has been granted shall be entitled at the expiration of the time stated on such

leave, to be reinstated to the position in which he was employed at the time the leave was granted. The Union shall be provided with a copy of the written leave, by the Employer, at the time such leave is granted.

7.02 Leave of absence shall be automatically granted all full-time employees who are called or volunteer for military service and such employees shall be reinstated to their former job at the expiration of their military service under and pursuant to the provisions of Section 45.50 of the Wisconsin Statutes, 1961.

ARTICLE VIII - Holidays

- 8.01 Each employee, upon the completion of his probationary period, shall be granted the following holidays off with pay:
 (1) New Year's Day, (2) Memorial Day, (3) Fourth of July,
- (4) Labor Day, (5) Veteran's Day, (6) Thanksgiving Day, and (7) Christmas Day, and one-half day on Good Friday. If any of the above mentioned holidays fall on a Sunday, the following Monday shall be deemed the holiday. If the holiday falls on a Saturday, the Friday before or the Monday following the holiday shall, in the discretion of the Employer, be declared the holiday. In addition to the above listed holiday, the last one-half of the work days before Christmas and New Year's shall be half day holidays when those days fall on weekdays Monday through Friday.
- 8.02 When employees are required to work on a holiday, they shall be paid time and one-half in addition to the holiday pay for all hours worked.

ARTICLE IX - Vacations

- 9.01 Each full-time employee shall receive one week vacation with pay each year after one year of employment, two weeks vacation with pay each year after three years of employment, and three weeks vacation with pay each year after fifteen years of continuous employment.
- 9.02 The numbers of employees on vacation, within a given classification, at any given period shall be determined by the Highway Commissioner.
- 9.03 Choice of vacation time, within a given classification, shall be by seniority.
- 9.04 Vacation pay shall be based on the employee's regularly established work week.
- 9.05 Employees who give at least two (2) weeks prior notice to quitting and employees whose service being terminated due to discharge or death or retirement shall receive all earned vacation based upon actual months of service. If an employee's service is terminated before the sixteenth (16th) of the month, he shall not receive credit for such month; however, if the termination occurs on or after the sixteenth (16th) of the month, credit for a full month shall be credited toward the pro-rated vacation allowance.

ARTICLE X - Sick Leave

- 10.01 Each full-time employee shall be granted and accumulate when not used, one sick leave day with pay for each month or major fraction thereof of employment until a total of sixty (60) days has been accumulated.
- 10.02 Sick leave pay shall begin on the first day of absence and notice must be given to the Employer prior to the regular starting time if at all possible for the employee to do so. Any employee off from work without a written leave of absence in

excess of three working days shall support his claim for sick leave benefits by satisfactory evidence that he was under a doctor's care while absent.

10.03 In the event of serious illness or death in an employee's immediate family, absence up to and including three (3) days will be allowed without loss of pay.

10.04 In the event of a death of an employee of the Iowa County Highway Department, all employees covered by this agreement shall be allowed one-half day off to attend the funeral without loss of pay.

ARTICLE XI - Health Insurance - Retirement Insurance

11.01 The Employer agrees to pay the employee's share of premium or one-half of the employee and dependent's share whichever is greater, for a group hospital and surgical insurance plan which shall be made a part of this agreement by reference. The terms, conditions and coverage of this plan to be negotiated between the parties from time to time as the need arises except that the group plan shall not be changed more than once per year under normal conditions.

11.02 The Employer agrees to pay the employee's contribution to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund to \$8,300.00 of their gross wages.

ARTICLE XII - Hours of Work - Wages and Classifications

12.01 The hours of work for regular full-time employees shall be eight (8) hours per day, 7:00 a.m. to 12 noon and from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. forty (40) hours per week, Monday through Friday. When other than the normal schedule of hours is required, the Employer and the Union shall confer and make every effort to reach an agreement each recognizing the needs and desires of the other.

12.02 It shall be the policy to keep overtime at a minimum and it is expected that overtime will be worked only in emergencies which are beyond the control of either party to this Agreement. All overtime shall be authorized by the Highway Commissioner or his representative. However, when it becomes necessary to work overtime, it shall be divided as equally as is reasonably possible among those employees qualified to perform the overtime work required and all employees shall be paid time and one-half for all such overtime worked in excess of their regular scheduled hours per day or per week.

12.03 Each employee, when not able to do so on his own time, shall be allowed time off without loss of pay to cast his ballot on all legally constituted elections.

12.04 "Appendix A," "Classification and Wages," attached hereto and made a part hereof shall be in effect for the life of this agreement.

ARTICLE XIII - Dues Deduction

13.01 The Employer agrees to deduct union dues from employees' wages upon written authorization by the employee. The deductions shall be made once each month and the total of such deductions made payable to the Union treasurer within ten (10) days of such deduction.

ARTICLE XIV - Alternation - Limitation - Duration

14.01 This agreement may be amended any time during its life upon the mutual consent of the Employer and the Union.

Such amendments shall be in writing, signed by the parties and attached to this agreement.

14.02 Neither party to this agreement by such act any time hereto and subsequently thereof agrees to, or does waiver any rights possessed by it, or them, under State or Federal Laws, regulations or statutes.

14.03 This agreement shall be effective as of January 1, 1975, and shall remain in full force and effect through December 31, 1975, and shall automatically renew itself from year to year thereafter until such time that either party desiring to altar, amend or otherwise change this agreement, serves written notice upon the other no later than September 1, 1975 or the first day of September of any year thereafter,

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Sup. Bishop addressed the Board stating the 51.42 Board was established to oversee all areas of Mental Health, Mental Retardation, Alcohol and Drug Abuse. Under the heading of Mental Retardation we have the Hodan Center, the 51.42 Boards of Grant and Iowa County contracts with the Hodan Center for their services. \$60,000.00 was budgeted by the state, meaning the Hodan Center is \$22,000.00 short of what the Hodan Center feels they need to operate. Iowa County Budgeted \$55,000.00 for the year 1975.

Considerable discussion followed regarding the financing of the programs by state and county funding.

Sup. Bishop stated that a transfer of some of the county funding would enable the Hodan Center to continue operation.

Sup. Bishop introduced Mr. Paul Random, Program director and Miss Jane Bishore, Development Disabilities Coordinator for the 51.42 Board.

Sup. Eichorst moved to allow the 51.42 Board to proceed with the county appropriation as they see fit.

Sup. Brown seconded the motion. Carried.

Linda Wescot, Youth Advocate, Southwestern Wisconsin Community Action Program, Inc. addressed the Board and presented Report (No. 10).

It was explained the program involves working on developing a pre-teen delinquency prevention program with funding thru LEAA, Criminal Justice Funds. Teachers contacted in the Dodgeville and Mineral Point school systems indicated they would be willing to refer people who had been screened through Chapter 89. The program is to be funded through Federal Funds with the State providing \$833.00 and an additional \$833.00 to be obtained through local matching funds. It is hoped the local funding could be obtained through the churches in the county. Verbal support was being requested of the Iowa County Board and the signature of the chairman of the County Board is needed to submit a grant request by April 7, 1975.

Sup. Laufenberg moved to grant preliminary approval and authorize the chairman to sign the grant request and an additional report be made to the County Board at the April, 1975 Session.

Sup. Pailing seconded the motion, Carried.
